Mr. GEORGE, from the Committee on Finance, submitted the following

REPORT

[To accompany H. J. Res. 431]

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the joint resolution (H. J. Res. 431) to extend to the 1940 New York World's Fair and the 1940 Golden Gate International Exposition the provisions according privileges under certain customs and other laws to the expositions of 1939, having considered the same, report thereon with the recommendation that it do pass without amendment.

The purpose of the joint resolution is to extend the provisions of existing law, which authorize importations by the New York World's Fair and the Golden Gate Exposition free of duty for exposition purposes, to importations by the respective expositions, which are to be continued during 1940.

The effect of the legislation is to make applicable to the 1940 fairs and the matter imported the same provisions of law which were applicable to the 1939 fairs.
