DUTY-FREE ENTRY OF CARILLON FOR MARQUETTE UNIVERSITY

Mr. Long, from the Committee on Finance, submitted the following

REPORT

[To accompany H.R. 3786]

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred the bill (H.R. 3786) to provide for the free entry of a four-octave carillon for the use of Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis., having considered the same, reports favorably thereon without amendment and recommends that the bill do pass.

PURPOSE

The purpose of H.R. 3786 is to provide duty-free entry of a fouroctave carillon for the use of Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis.

GENERAL STATEMENT

H.R. 3786 would authorize and direct the Secretary of the Treasury to admit free of duty a four-octave carillon for the use of Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis. The bill further provides that if liquidation of the entry has become final, such entry shall be reliquidated and the appropriate refund of duty made.

The committee is informed that the carillon for the use of Marquette University was entered at Milwaukee, Wis., on September 12, 1967. The aggregate value of the carillon was \$63,320, and duties in the amount of \$4,115.80 were deposited. In favorably considering similar bills in the past, the committee has been informed by appropriate agencies of Government, including the Tariff Commission, that such bells are not produced in the United States. Envorable reports from appropriate agencies were received on an identical bill in the 91st Congress (H.R. 6702).

EFFECT ON THE REVENUES OF THE BILL AND VOTE OF THE COMMITTEE IN REPORTING THE BILL

The committee estimates that extending duty-free treatment to the entry of a four-octave carillon for the use of Marquette University will result in a revenue loss of \$4,115.80, the amount of the duty deposited.

In compliance with section 133 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 as amended, the following statement is made relative to the vote by the committee on reporting the bill. This bill was ordered favorably reported by the committee without objection. No rollcall vote was taken.
