REPORT

[To accompany S. J. Res. 168]

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the joint resolution (S. J. Res. 168) authorizing the President to invite the States of the Union and foreign countries to participate in the International Petroleum Exposition at Tulsa, Okla., to be held May 16 to 23, 1936, inclusive, having had the same under consideration, report it to the Senate without amendment and recommend that the joint resolution

The joint resolution provides that the President is authorized to invite the States of the Union and all foreign countries to participate in the proposed International Petroleum Exposition, to be held at Tulsa, Okla., from May 16 to 23, 1936. It is specifically provided in section 3 of the joint resolution that the United States Government is not obligated to any expense in connection with the holding of such exposition and is not to be obligated hereafter other than for suitable representation at the exposition.

Section 2 of the joint resolution is identical with the usual form of resolutions, heretofore passed by Congress and approved by the President, permitting the importation of articles free of duty for the

purposes of exhibition.
