Mr. MILLS, from the committee of conference, submitted the following

CONFERENCE REPORT

[To accompany H.R. 5768]

The committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendments of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 5768) to extend for an additional temporary period the existing suspension of duties on certain classifications of yarn of silk, having met, after full and free conference, have agreed to recommend and do recommend to their respective Houses as follows:

That the House recede from its disagreement to the amendment of the Senate to the text of the bill, and agree to the same with an amendment, as follows:

In lieu of the matter proposed to be inserted by the Senate amendment insert the following:

SEC. 2. The President shall promptly cause a study to be made of the feasibility and desirability of separate classification in the Tariff Schedules of the United States for those yarns of man-made fibers commonly referred to as textured or texturized yarns. He shall report the results of such study, including any recommendations as to the appropriate rate or rates of duty for such yarns, to the House of Representatives and to the Senate not later than February 1, 1966.

And the Senate agree to the same.

That the House recede from its disagreement to the amendment of the Senate to the title of the bill and agree to the same.

STATEMENT OF THE MANAGERS ON THE PART OF THE HOUSE

The managers on the part of the House at the conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendments of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 5768) to extend for an additional temporary period of existing suspension of duties on certain classifications of yarn of silk, submit the following statement in explanation of the effect of the action agreed upon by the conferees and recommended in the accompanying conference report:

The Senate amendment to the text of the bill added a new item to the Tariff Schedules of the United States providing a rate of duty of 25 cents per pound plus 30 percent ad valorem for yarns of continuous manmade fibers having special characteristics of bulk or elasticity imparted to the yarns or the fibers by heating, twisting and untwisting, crimping, curling, or other processing. The House recedes with an amendment. The conference agreement substitutes provisions under which the President is promptly to cause a study to be made of the feasibility and desirability of separate classification in the Tariff Schedules of the United States for those yarns of manmade fibers commonly referred to as textured or texturized yarns. The President is to report the results of such study, including any recommendations as to the appropriate rate or rates of duty for such yarns, to the House of Representatives and to the Senate not later than February 1, 1966.

The House recedes on the amendment of the Senate to the title of the bill.
