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The Chairman. Gentlemen, let me tell you what we have here, and I will call upon Jeff Lang to speak to the details in a much more knowledgeable subject, but what we have is the Administration asking that we move expeditiously in order to make make Poland eligible for the Generalized System of Preferences. That does not mean that we bring it about just by our action here today, but that we make it then eligible for the President to make that kind of a decision.

I think that probably in addition to that we have some other things that have to be done by the Congress later in that regard. I am not sure of that.

But here you have a country, Poland, where the per capita income is really extremely low, where they need what assistance they can get, and they are trying their best to move towards democracy. And you can even see some sharing of power, which is almost unprecedented under a communist government.

And the President will be visiting there, and, of course,

I would assume at that point he wants to make that jesture to

Poland to try to encourage their move toward democracy. And

I personally am sympathetic to the President in his efforts to

do that.

Jeff, would you speak to this issue in more detail?

Mr. Lang. Yes, sir.

Under current law, there is a list of countries which are

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ineligible for GSP under any circumstances: the basically 2 developed countries, certain communist countries, and countries that are for foreign policy reasons not designated, like South Africa. Poland is on that list. And all this bill does is delete Poland from the list, which means that it is eligible for designation. The President still has to go through a series of criteria in order to designate the countries to the list. For example, he has to determine if they do not deny workers' rights, or that he should waive that condition because they are making progress in that area, that sort of thing.

Also it is important to recongize that when he designates the country he also designates the products. Only about a quarter of the U.S. tariff schedule is eligible for GSP and he does not need to designate all of those products, but that is not under the program.

So that is the basic situation.

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The Chairman. Let me interrupt here. Let's scour that floor and get us another member to make this a quorum.

Senator Rockefeller. I will move it, Mr. Chairman.

The Chairman. Now wait a minute. We need one more.

Senator Moynihan. Mr. Chairman, while we are waiting, can I just say that over on the House side--and Mr. Frenzo on this side--I have introduced a measure that would give Hungary five years in that instead of one year at a time as it renews.

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The President is going to Poland the Moongrade--and it's 2 time they did that -- and it is hoped that there was something he 3 could say now to that government. But the State Department 4 has found that this is correct. 5 And so I would like the committee to know that at one 6 point we were prepared. I think the committee would have been 7 prepared, except that the State Department was not ready. 8 have heard that before though. 9 The Chairman. All right. We can do that, we can hold 10 that in abeyance. 11 Do you want to make your motion? 12 Senator Rockefeller. I will move it, Mr. Chairman. 13 Senator Roth. I second the motion. 14 The Chairman.
