- 1 OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. ORRIN G. HATCH, A U.S. SENATOR
- 2 FROM UTAH, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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- 4 The Chairman. So it appears that a quorum is now
- 5 present. We will now move to executive session to
- 6 consider the nominations of Mr. Kearns, Mr. Doud, and Mr.
- 7 Gerrish.
- 8 At this time, I would entertain a motion to
- 9 favorably report the nomination of Jason Kearns to be a
- 10 member of the United States International Trade
- 11 Commission.
- 12 Senator Wyden. Mt. Chairman, I so move.
- 13 The Chairman. Okay. Does any Senator require a
- 14 recorded vote?
- 15 [No response.]
- The Chairman. Okay. Then all in favor, say "aye."
- 17 [A chorus of ayes.]
- The Chairman. Any opposed?
- 19 [No response.]
- The Chairman. Then he will be moved out. The
- 21 "ayes" have it. The nomination is ordered favorably
- 22 reported.
- 23 At this time, I would entertain a motion to
- 24 favorably report the nomination of Gregory Doud to be
- 25 Chief Agricultural Negotiator, Office of the United

- 1 States Trade Representative, with the rank of Ambassador.
- Senator Wyden. I would so move, Mr. Chairman.
- 3 The Chairman. Okay. Does any Senator require a
- 4 recorded vote?
- 5 [No response.]
- 6 The Chairman. If not, then all of those in favor
- 7 will say "aye."
- 8 [A chorus of ayes.]
- 9 The Chairman. Any opposed, say "no."
- [No response.]
- 11 The Chairman. The "ayes" have it. The nomination
- is ordered favorably reported.
- 13 At this time, I would entertain a motion to
- 14 favorably report the nomination of Jeffrey Gerrish to be
- Deputy United States Trade Representative for Asia,
- 16 Europe, the Middle East, and Industrial Competitiveness,
- 17 with the rank of Ambassador.
- 18 Senator Wyden. Mr. Chairman?
- 19 The Chairman. Yes, sir?
- 20 Senator Wyden. Before we vote on this nominee, I
- 21 would like to be heard briefly.
- The Chairman. I would be happy to listen to you.
- 23 Senator Wyden. Colleagues, Mr. Gerrish cast a vote
- in November's election in the Commonwealth of Virginia
- 25 where he did not live. He moved to Maryland in July of

- 1 2016, and he cast his vote well outside of the grace
- 2 period Virginia grants former residents.
- It seems to me it takes a big error in judgment for
- 4 a lawyer as experienced as Mr. Gerrish to violate
- 5 election law. Mr. Gerrish did not choose to address the
- 6 issue in his opening statement, and when given the
- 7 opportunity to say this was a serious matter, he would
- 8 not agree with that either.
- 9 There is obviously some context here, because the
- 10 administration has made it clear that they think there is
- 11 a crisis of voter fraud out there. I do not happen to
- 12 agree with it, but certainly there is a real double-
- standard when we are hearing about the dangers of voter
- fraud all of the time and then we see a nominee coming up
- who appears to have cast an illegal vote.
- 16 If I understand it, this matter of Mr. Gerrish's
- vote was referred to the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office
- in Fairfax, Virginia by both the Democrat and the
- 19 Republican who make up the Fairfax County Elections
- Office. Because this matter has now been sent to the
- 21 appropriate law enforcement officials and the inquiry is
- ongoing, I will not be able to support this nominee at
- this time.
- 24 The Chairman. All right.
- 25 Senator Carper. Mr. Chairman, could I be heard on

- 1 this, please?
- The Chairman. You sure can, Senator.
- 3 Senator Carper. A question of Senator Wyden, and,
- 4 perhaps, others -- my guess is, if we are honest in this
- 5 room and ask if anybody had ever gone back to their old
- 6 residence and voted in an election, we would find that a
- 7 number of people had done that, and probably in violation
- 8 of the law.
- 9 What troubles me about this is that if that was what
- 10 happened -- and we all live busy lives, live in one
- 11 place, work in another place, changes of residence,
- raising a family, and sometimes you miss a chance to
- change your registration in a timely way. If that is
- 14 what happened here, he should just say that. He should
- just be honest about it. I screwed up. I should not
- 16 have done it. I realized -- I wanted to vote. If that
- is all that it was, then this would be, as Harry Reid
- used to say, a "nothing burger."
- I am told, Mr. Chairman, that there is an
- 20 investigation that is going on. It is going to be
- 21 concluded at the end of this week.
- I would ask you to consider just delaying this for
- like a week, and for us to take it up next week. Looking
- 24 him over -- I have not met with him, but he appears to be
- 25 quite well-qualified. I think most of -- maybe all of us

- 1 -- would be ready to support him.
- 2 But the rush to judgment before -- if there is an
- 3 investigation underway that is going to be concluded next
- 4 month or next year, that is one thing. It is this week.
- 5 It is this week, and I really just urge us to take the
- 6 time, get that done, and have a chance to vote.
- 7 My guess is, if all it is is the way I describe it,
- 8 if it is innocent, then my guess is he is going to be
- 9 confirmed and out of here and reported out of here
- 10 favorably.
- 11 Senator Wyden. Would my colleague yield?
- 12 Senator Carper. Sure.
- 13 Senator Wyden. I think my colleague has made an
- important point. He has noted that there is an
- investigation going on. It is an investigation
- instituted by both a Democrat and a Republican. It seems
- 17 to me that we have not gotten adequate answers as of
- 18 today.
- I think that my colleague from Delaware has made a
- 20 reasonable request that we hold off until we see what
- 21 this inquiry finds and then take it up at that time.
- 22 Senator Carper. Thank you for your comments.
- 23 Mr. Hatch, I think you know me. I try to be a fair
- person, and I am trying to be fair here as well.
- The Chairman. Well, you are. You always have

- been, and I appreciate that.
- 2 Does anybody else have any comments about this?
- 3 Senator Cornyn. Mr. Chairman?
- 4 The Chairman. Yes?
- 5 Senator Cornyn. The other option would be to vote
- 6 the nominee out of the committee. Obviously, it will be
- 7 a delay between the committee vote and floor action where
- 8 there will be plenty of an opportunity to further explore
- 9 this matter. Just a suggestion.
- 10 The Chairman. Well, I would prefer to do that
- 11 because of the heavy schedule that we have in this
- 12 committee.
- 13 Senator Wyden. Mr. Chairman?
- 14 Senator Nelson. So if you do that, Mr. Chairman,
- it is going to be partisan -- it may not be partisan if
- 16 you defer to the ideas of the Senator from Delaware.
- 17 The Chairman. Well, I think the committee has
- 18 thoroughly reviewed the nomination of Mr. Gerrish. He
- 19 has been straightforward with the committee about the
- fact that he voted in Virginia in November of 2016,
- 21 several months after becoming a Maryland resident.
- I believe committee members do have enough
- 23 information to judge Mr. Gerrish on the totality of his
- 24 experience, knowledge, and qualifications to serve as
- Deputy USTR. For me, there is no question that Mr.

- 1 Gerrish is extremely well-qualified for this position,
- and I support favorably reporting his nomination.
- 3 Senator Wyden. Mr. Chairman?
- 4 The Chairman. Yes, Senator Wyden?
- 5 Senator Wyden. Mr. Chairman, again, I think what
- 6 our colleague from Delaware is saying is extremely
- 7 reasonable, and I was here for the hearing.
- 8 Number one, this investigation is ongoing as of
- 9 right now, and it was made as part of a bipartisan
- 10 request. Number two, the nominee did not choose to
- 11 address this in his opening statement. If he had come in
- here and said, hey, I just really blew this, it was a
- terrible mistake for the following reasons, I think it
- would have been a different hearing.
- Then I gave him the opportunity to pretty much say
- the same thing and to indicate it was a really serious
- 17 matter, and as my colleague from Delaware said, he just
- 18 blew it. That is why I am not willing to go forward
- today on the basis of the fact that there is an
- 20 investigation into this that is ongoing.
- 21 The Chairman. Well, a recorded vote has been
- 22 requested. So I think we will move ahead with the vote
- 23 here, and we have plenty of time between now and the
- 24 floor to explore this further. I am certainly going to
- 25 be interested in whatever the ranking member finds.

- 1 Senator Wyden. Fine.
- 2 The Chairman. So the clerk will call the roll.
- 3 The Clerk. Mr. Grassley?
