OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MAX BAUCUS, A U.S. SENATOR FROM 1 MONTANA, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE 2

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The meeting will come to order. We meet today to consider S.J. Res. 16 which renews 5 6 the important ban on products of Burma. Following our 7 mark-up today we will meet in Executive Session to 8 discuss the Currency Exchange Rate Oversight Reform Act.

The Chairman.

"Please use your liberty to promote ours." 9 So wrote Nobel Peace Prize winner, Aung San Suu Kyi, winner of 10 11 Burma's National League for Democracy in 1997. In 1990. 12 Suu Kyi won Burma's last democratic election for Prime Minister, though members of Burma's military did not let 13 14 her take office.

15 In 2003, the Burmese Military Junta cracked down further on Suu Kyi and her followers. America responded 16 17 by imposing sanctions against Burma, including a ban on 18 imports.

19 Sanctions were appropriate, but because unilateral sanctions often fail, Senator Grassley and I worked 20 21 together to ensure that the import ban on Burmese 22 products would not be open-ended. We agreed to revisit the ban on an annual basis. That way we could assure 23 24 that sanctions remain the appropriate policy tool to 25 address America's human rights concerns with Burma.

Today, four years later, the situation in Burma 1 remains grave. Suu Kyi continues to be a virtual 2 3 prisoner in her own home. The Burmese Military Junta continues to kill, rape, and drag people into forced 4 The Junta arrests political activists, or causes 5 labor. them to simply disappear. Members of the security forces 6 7 continue to torture, beat, and abuse detainees, and the 8 Junta has strangled what had been a growing economy.

9 Like the United States, many of Burma's trading partners in Europe and Southeast Asia have deep concerns 10 11 with Burma's worsening conditions. They, too, have taken 12 steps to isolate the Burmese Junta. ASEAN countries have previously declined to publicly express concern over the 13 14 human rights situation in Burma, but now some of them 15 have stepped forward.

For our sanctions be truly effective, however, we must have a more coordinated effect with other countries. We must especially work with Burma's immediate neighbors. I hope that we can see more progress on that front in the year ahead.

Given today's situation in Burma, our import ban remains the right tool. For the Burmese people, the Congress should renew it. Let us do so today, and let us use our liberty to promote theirs.

We should send a strong signal to the military Junta that their ongoing behavior 10 11 is unacceptable.

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Mr. Chairman, I just want to Senator Stabenow. 4 thank you for bringing this forward. There is no 5 question that what has happened to Aung San Suu Kyi is an 6 outrage. All of the women of the Senate, Democrats and 7 Republicans, have joined in a special caucus. We had a 8 press conference with our First Lady, Laura Bush, a few 9 10 weeks ago to call for her release. I appreciate your bringing this forward. I think it is important for the 11 12 committee to get this done.
