#### Dear Senator Cardin,

As you are aware, CASA is the mid-Atlantic region's largest immigrant serving and advocacy organization representing over 94,000 members in the area with a mission to create a more just society by building power and improving the quality of life in low-income immigrant communities. CASA is a national leader in supporting immigrant families and ensuring that all individuals have the core supports necessary for full participation in society while impacting the regional and national debate on immigrants and public policy.

Since 2013, CASA has been a key partner in the implementation of the Affordable Care Act in Maryland, working with State and County agencies in the promotion, navigation and enrollment of eligible Maryland residents into expanded Medicaid options as well newly created coverage opportunities made possible through the Maryland Health Benefit Exchange. Thanks to Maryland's early embrace of the Affordable Care Act and the generous navigation supports it committed from the onset, CASA has helped enroll over 11,000 Maryland residents into various insurance coverage options, the large majority of whom obtained access to a health insurance plan for the first time in their lives. Stated simply, the ACA provisions for pre-existing conditions, Medicaid expansion, Qualified Health Plan coverage for taxpaying immigrant workers, and minimum essential coverage have made it possible for our community to access affordable, quality healthcare.

The Graham-Cassidy Healthcare Proposal will largely dismantle the impressive progress that we have achieved together in Maryland, not only will it deprive over 11,000 members of our community, but 30 million more Americans of quality, affordable healthcare. Specifically, it will bar over 3,000 of CASA's tax-paying members with Temporary Protected Status (TPS) from the opportunity to apply for tax credits and make them immediately ineligible for any type of health insurance coverage. It will remove personal privacy protections that are in place to protect all health insurance consumers, including CASA's members. Graham-Cassidy will drive healthcare consumers into the shadows and without access to primary care, our community will have to go to hospitals when health problems become severe,

jeopardizing the sustainability of Maryland's Hospital All-Payer Model. Access to quality, affordable healthcare is a basic human right in a thriving society such as ours, and it is against the very nature of our moral fabric to rip it away from 30 million Americans, including CASA's membership.

Senator Cardin, in closing, we call on you to denounce the Graham-Cassidy Healthcare Bill and to work with your colleagues on both sides of the aisle to end its terrible path. We have much work to still accomplish in our state to ensure health access to all including many in our immigrant communities that remain without coverage options today, a number that will only increase with the Trump administration's continued assault on our communities including the possible termination of TPS for over 22,000 of our State's residents. The Graham-Cassidy bill will only serve to destroy the remarkable progress that we have achieved together. We appeal for your continued work towards a just and affordable healthcare system that will benefit all residents of this country.

We at the Maryland Health Care For All! Coalition, representing over 1200 faith, community, labor, business and health care groups from across Maryland, commend you and Senator Chris Van Hollen for strongly opposing the disastrous new Senate proposal to gut the Affordable Care Act and deny health care to hundreds of thousands of Marylanders and millions of Americans. We also commend Governor Larry Hogan for describing the so-called Graham-Cassidy bill as "not a solution" for Maryland.

The fact is that the Medicaid program which this proposal would decimate has saved the lives of many Marylanders and helped many others lead better lives. We are holding forums across the state to highlight people who have benefited from Medicaid and their stories are touching and important. See <a href="www.healthcareforall.com">www.healthcareforall.com</a> for more information on these forums. Last evening at our latest forum in Silver Spring, Maryland, with Rep. Jamie Raskin we heard from Alvin Butler who movingly told us how after he lost his job and was on Medicaid, he had a heart attack and is only alive now because of the health care services his Medicaid card enabled him to get. And, we heard from Karen White who told us how her daughter with serious mental health issues is only able to live a full life because of the help which the Medicaid program is providing for her. And, we heard from Mila Johns who told us how her young daughter (also in the audience) is here today because when Ms. Johns was pregnant she had Medicaid coverage to get her the prenatal care she needed. There are countless Marylanders and millions of Americans with similar stories.

In addition, we all benefit from the Affordable Care Act's Medicaid expansion because, as reported by the Maryland Center on Economic Policy, it has resulted in big drop in uncompensated hospital care which has translated into health insurance premiums for most people going up much more slowly than before the Affordable Care Act. From fiscal year 2013 to 2015, hospital uncompensated care costs declined by approximately \$311 million. Also during this time, the average costs for group health insurance costs increased at a slower rate

than before, increasing by 20 percent over the past five years (2011-2016) compared to a 31 percent increase over the prior five year period.

Instead of trying to weaken health care coverage, we should work together to strengthen the Affordable Care Act in order to achieve our common goal of quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders.

Thank you so much for all your critical leadership over the years on health care coverage and public health issues and we look forward to working with you to achieve our common goal of quality, affordable health care for all Americans.

Graham-Cassidy "Repeal and Replace" Proposal

#### Dear Senator Cardin:

This proposal, to be heard in the Senate Finance Committee on September 25, poses a serious threat to many of the children, families, and seniors that nonprofit organizations in Maryland serve every day, whether their specific programs involve recreation or cultural experiences, education, childcare, job-training, or actual direct health or mental health care.

The Affordable Care Act and the expansion of Medicaid services it has allowed, have effectively cut by half the number of Marylanders without health insurance, and the impact in rural areas of the State has been even greater. That reduction has resulted in a significant decline, more than \$300 million, in the cost of uncompensated care required of Maryland hospitals from Fiscal year 2013 to 2015.

The proposal before the Committee on Monday could effectively reverse these benefits for previously uninsured Marylanders, and the savings realized by all other insureds through our all-payer system.

Further, as Fitch Ratings reported last week, the longer-term reductions in Medicaid funds to states across the nation embedded in this proposal pose a budgetary threat to other entities or programs dependent on state funding, including public schools, towns and cities, and higher education. Maryland alone would lose over \$4.8 billion by 2026, while the Kirwan Commission is expected to report later this year that public schools in the state will require an increase in funds of a similar scale over roughly the same period.

The Affordable Care Act needs to be strengthened and improved – not dismantled – to assure that all Marylanders can have affordable access to quality health care. We agree with Governor Hogan that "Unfortunately, the Graham-Cassidy bill is not a solution that works for Maryland. It will cost our state over \$2 billion annually while directly jeopardizing the health care of our citizens."



We urge you and Senator Van Hollen to continue your efforts to defeat the Graham-Cassidy proposal and to advance bi-partisan attempts to improve on the success that the Affordable Care Act has already achieved.

Garrett Regional Medical Center, an affiliate of WVU Medicine, provides care for the people in one of Maryland's most rural and remote communities. As such, many of our patients live in poverty and face severe health issues. After reviewing the latest proposed effort to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act (ACA), I am greatly dismayed. The bill crafted by Senators Lindsay Graham and Bill Cassidy would have a calamitous effect on the people we serve, especially as our service area encompasses communities not only in Maryland but in West Virginia and Pennsylvania.

The bill's move to cap Medicaid spending and reduce federal spending on health through funding block grants to states will exacerbate an already serious problem regarding health care in rural communities. According to iVantage Health Analytics, there are 673 rural hospitals across the United States that are susceptible to closing. This bill would dramatically increase the number of vulnerable rural hospitals while also putting the people in all rural communities who struggle with poverty at risk of losing access to the care they have gained through the ACA.

For rural America, this bill would be disastrous.

Other elements of the bill would compound the problems above, including the ending of subsidies provided through the ACA and ending individual and employer mandates.

The Affordable Care Act is an imperfect law that needs to be reworked to more fully provide for and ensure access to health care for all Americans. However, repealing it and replacing it with a system that will in effect limit the care available and reduce access to care makes no sense. Garrett Regional Medical Center fully supports efforts to defeat this bill and move forward with a sensible, bipartisan effort to address health care in the United States.

#### Promoting Access to Comprehensive Opioid Treatment in Maryland

I am writing on behalf of the Maryland Association for the Treatment of Opioid Dependence (MATOD) to express the strongest opposition possible to the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson proposal.

MATOD represents over 65 healthcare organizations across Maryland that provide and promote high-quality, effective medication assisted treatment for Opioid addiction. MATOD members include thousands of highly trained and dedicated addiction counselors, social workers, physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, psychologists, peer recovery specialists and office personnel who dedicate every day to save lives. Maryland's Behavioral Health Administration reported that as of June 2017, over 30,000 Marylanders were enrolled in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTP) receiving Methadone and Buprenorphine, in conjunction with counseling and other medical services. Unfortunately, we are serving only a fraction of the friends, neighbors, co-workers, family members and others Marylanders who need medication-assisted treatment. The proposed bill creates multiple barriers to life-saving treatments.

The Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson "Health Care" bill is more accurately referred to as a "Don't Care" bill, since its passage would cost thousands of Maryland lives. The bill would remove essential protections for people with behavioral health disorders and pre-existing conditions, while reducing access and availability to substance use disorder treatments during the worst opioid epidemic in our state's and country's history.

The proposed bill would negatively impact over 975,000 Marylanders who rely on Medicaid, including 77,000 seniors; 148,000 individuals with disabilities; and 32,000 veterans. The bill would drastically cut \$6,000 from every Marylander enrolled in Medicaid and Medicaid expansion plans, without the provision of any safety net or alternatives to receive care. The bill will severely jeopardize Maryland's long-successful Hospital All-Payer Model and the financial stability of Maryland's rural hospitals.

Maryland stands to lose over \$2 billion in state and federal funding in FY2020, and almost \$5 billion in federal Medicaid funding by 2026. Thousands of lives will be lost and countless neighborhood communities decimated under the proposed bill. Unlike the ACA, this misguided bill contains no consumer safeguards and will put thousands of Marylanders at risk by:

- Rolling back protections for Americans with pre-existing conditions;
- Ending the Medicaid expansion that helps low-income adults and families;
- Repealing Individual and Employer Mandates;
- Establishing a per-capita cap on Medicaid;
- Eliminating financial assistance that helps low and moderate income families purchase health care coverage;
- Defunding Planned Parenthood;
- Allowing imposition of unreasonable work requirements as a condition of Medicaid coverage;
- Requiring those with a break in coverage to wait six months before getting new coverage

Please feel free to share our concerns with your colleagues and others who you think might benefit from seeing them.

We thank you, Senator Cardin, for your decades of work on behalf of healthcare for all Marylanders, and stand with you in your fight against the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson proposal.



#### Dear Senator Cardin:

I am writing to you on behalf of MedChi, The Maryland State Medical Society, to express our concern with the Graham-Cassidy proposal, the latest plan to repeal the Affordable Care Act. MedChi stands with the American Medical Association (AMA) and Maryland's Governor Hogan in opposition to the Graham-Cassidy proposal, as it ends several protections provided by the Affordable Care Act, including coverage for our most vulnerable patients, safeguards for our patients with pre-existing conditions, and protection of patient choice.

If this bill passes, the coverage of almost one million Maryland residents who depend on Medicaid, including 77,000 senior residents, 148,000 individuals with disabilities, and 32,000 veterans, would be affected. Maryland would lose \$2.1 billion dollars in state and federal funding in FY2020, and by FY2026, \$4.8 billion in federal Medicaid funding. Nationally, the Congressional Budget Office estimated 32 million people would lose coverage, including the 12 million newly eligible low-income Medicaid expansion enrollees. 10 million would be at risk for significant increases in out-of-pocket costs and coverage loss once advanced premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions are eliminated. As the AMA previously stated, the proposed per-capita cap on Medicaid "could convert the Medicaid program into a system that limits federal support to care for needy patients [using an] insufficient predetermined formula based on per-capita caps," as per-capita caps "fail to take into account unanticipated costs of new medical innovations or the fiscal impact of public health epidemics, such as [the Opioid Crisis]."

The Graham-Cassidy proposal does not prioritize affordable coverage and access to health care for all Americans. The proposal eliminates the safeguards for patients with pre-existing conditions, and even though insurers are still required to offer coverage to patients with pre-existing conditions, states may apply for waivers to vary premiums based on health status. These waivers would allow insurers to charge increased premiums based on pre-existing conditions. Additionally, states could apply for waivers of essential health benefits, which would mean patients could lose access to necessary treatment and services. The Graham-Cassidy bill also severely jeopardizes Maryland's Hospital All-Payor Model and the financial stability of Maryland's rural hospitals, interfering with Maryland residents' access to health care in remote areas.





The Graham-Cassidy proposal also impedes patient choice by prohibiting Medicaid recipients from using their Medicaid coverage at clinics operated by Planned Parenthood and other similar organizations. This restriction limits the patients' freedom to choose their providers, as well as influences physicians from practicing in a setting of their own choice.

This latest proposal to amend the Affordable Care Act is not the solution to the United States' health care problems. As Governor Hogan said, "We need common sense, bipartisan solutions that will stabilize markets and actually expand affordable coverage."



You have been a steadfast champion for our state, and we thank you for taking a strong stand for the health of all Marylanders and all Americans.

The legislation currently under consideration in the Senate, known as the Graham-Cassidy-Heller Bill is a deeply concerning and if enacted would be extremely harmful to the health and lives of millions of people.

As the Senate continues to work on health reform in general, we urge you to take these ideas into consideration and ask for your help in communicating them to your colleagues in the Senate. These core principles are not about party or politics, they are about doing what is right for the health of our nation.

# Principles and Recommendations for Health Reform

The Primary Care Coalition works on the front lines of a changing health care system. A system that can be improved dramatically—specifically by becoming more equitable, accessible, and affordable for all patients in need, while driving efficiency and promoting high-quality, high-value care. To that end, we offer the following principles and recommendations to help guide your work on any effort to reform the health care system moving forward. We believe these principles are shared by many health centers and other safety-net providers across the country.

- 1. First, do no harm do not eliminate coverage for any Marylander or any American. This should be the guiding principle of efforts to reform the health care system to sustain the number of people covered by insurance and maintain the accessibility, affordability, and quality of that coverage for every American.
- 2. Maintain a strong and viable safety net through Medicaid. Medicaid and community based health safety-net providers work synchronously to ensure patients have access to affordable, high-quality care as well as reliable and predictable coverage. Health reform legislation should build on successes within Medicaid, not simply shift the burden of operating and financing the program to the States. Specifically, we cannot support proposals to place caps on the federal share of Medicaid payments or to institute broad block grants, or attempts to roll back the federal commitment to the Medicaid program.
- 3. Strengthen minimum benefits and consumer protections. It is critical that any final legislation ensure individual market plans and Medicaid cover a minimum set of essential health benefits, and either maintain or strengthen protections afforded to the millions of patients with pre-existing conditions.

Concerns with the Graham- Cassidy -Heller Bill

Over the course of 2017, Congress has debated measures to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act; all of which had common features that would be detrimental to patients and to the ability of safety-net providers to deliver care. The Graham-Casidy-Heller Proposal is no different.

- 1. Rollback of Coverage. If a core tenant of health care delivery is to first do no harm, the Graham-Cassidy-Heller bill would have the opposite effect by eliminating the Medicaid expansion, cost-sharing subsidies, tax-credits, and the individual and employer mandates. A portion of the funding for these programs is distributed to the states as block grants. States like Maryland that expanded Medicaid are punished, receiving a smaller block grant as funds are redistributed to states that refused to expand Medicaid. These block grants will grow at a rate set much lower than medical inflation, leaving states with an increasing share of costs each year. The block grants end in 2027 with no plan for ongoing funding. In Maryland, the 240,000 people who gained health insurance between 2013 and 2016 would be forced into much more limited coverage and could find themselves at risk losing their coverage completely; becoming uninsured once again.
- 2. Medicaid Per-Capita Cap. In Maryland, nearly 1.2 million people are enrolled with a Medicaid Managed Care Organization—just under 20% of the population. The proposed bill would convert Medicaid into a per-capita cap program that increases at a rate much lower than actual Medical inflation. The effect of this would be increasing cuts each year. This change represents an enormous shift of risk to state and local governments, already hamstrung by significant budget challenges. More importantly, because federal Medicaid contributions would grow more slowly than health care costs, states would be forced to either raise taxes or make increasingly dramatic cuts to covered benefits, beneficiary eligibility, and provider payments.

Having a strong Medicaid program in Maryland has allowed providers to bolster our capacity and to offer a more comprehensive range of services such as behavioral health and substance abuse services. Those who lose Medicaid under this legislation will lose access to critical specialty care services, and increasingly will return to seeking care in emergency rooms, ultimately leading to higher costs and poorer health outcomes.

3. Weakening Covered Benefits and Consumer Protections. We oppose any measure that would allow insurers to once again discriminate against individuals with pre-existing conditions or weaken the Essential Health Benefits package, allowing insurers to offer plans that don't cover many basic services including maternity care, mental health, and substance abuse treatment. Currently, there are no definitive requirements or strong federal standards for essential benefits or pre-existing coverage in the Graham-Cassidy-Heller Proposal.

We deeply appreciate the opportunity to offer these recommendations and stand ready to work with you and your colleagues to develop health policy proposals that improve both our overall system and the lives and health of those we serve.

Dear Senator Cardin:

Thank you for your leadership on health care and, in particular, your work to preserve the gains we have made under the Affordable Care Act. I am writing to express our strong opposition to the Cassidy-Graham proposal, which would undermine all the progress we've made in expanding health coverage. It would cause tens of millions of people to lose coverage, while costs would go up for millions more.

Thanks to the ACA, the percentage of Marylanders without health coverage dropped from more than 10 percent in 2012 to less than 7 percent in 2015. The Cassidy-Graham proposal would reverse that. Medicaid expansion, which has extended coverage to more than 290,000 Marylanders and 11 million people nationwide, would be eliminated. The ACA's marketplace subsidies, which help nearly 9 million people nationwide afford coverage — would be gone.

Instead, states would get a much smaller, temporary block grant of money. Because the amount of money would be fixed each year, Maryland would be on the hook for any and all unexpected costs from recessions, natural disasters, public health emergencies, or prescription drug price spikes. And, after 2026, this money would disappear altogether.

The core Medicaid program in all states — not just those like Maryland that expanded Medicaid under the ACA — would be radically restructured and cut, putting at risk care for seniors, people with disabilities and families with children, including services such as home- and community-based care. These cuts also strike at the heart of Maryland's efforts to address our opioid crisis.

The bill would slash federal funding for health coverage for Maryland by nearly \$5 billion in 2027 alone as a result of these changes.

Pre-existing conditions protections would be left to the whims of each state. In fact, a state could let insurers charge people with health conditions exorbitant, unaffordable premiums and sell plans that leave out essential benefits like maternity care and mental

health care. While Maryland has a history of enacting better than average policies, destabilizing the insurance market could pressure the state to loosen protections.

Women's health is also on the line: the bill sneaks in a provision that prohibits states from reimbursing Planned Parenthood for preventive health and family planning services. Maryland has proactively planned to replace these funds with state dollars, but given the cuts in federal support for health care that are also a part of this bill, that may not be financially feasible.

We ask that you continue to do everything you can to prevent this incredibly harmful bill from reaching the Senate floor. Then, Congress can focus on a bipartisan effort to strengthen our insurance marketplace, control costs, and preserve and expand coverage.

#### Dear Senator Cardin:

On behalf of our 64 member hospitals and health systems, the Maryland Hospital Association appreciates the opportunity to provide feedback on the Graham-Cassidy health care proposal. The Maryland Hospital Association urges senators to oppose this proposal.

While the bill has not yet been scored by the Congressional Budget Office, coverage for thousands of Marylanders, especially our most vulnerable citizens, is at risk. The bill would make deep cuts to the Medicaid program, as well as the health care subsidies that help people afford coverage, including more than \$2 billion in cuts to Maryland. This is not a partisan matter. Maryland's Republican Governor Larry Hogan said this week that the Graham-Cassidy bill is "not a solution that works for Maryland and directly jeopardizing the health care of our citizens." In other words, the Graham-Cassidy proposal would cause real pain for real people. This proposal seems to be less about helping people and more about attracting votes.

High-quality, efficient health care simply cannot be achieved without broad-based, continuous coverage, which would be drastically reduced under this proposal. Reductions of this magnitude inhibit hospitals from getting people the right care, at the right time, in the right setting, which in turn reduces people's chances to live healthier lives. In Maryland, the 310,000 people who gained coverage through the Affordable Care Act, and another 160,000 who gained Medicaid coverage due to a previous state expansion, are at serious risk.

The loss of broad-based coverage also jeopardizes Maryland's unique hospital payment system, which has benefited the state, insurers, patients and communities by shifting from volume-driven to value-driven care. But without adequate coverage, this system, which contains costs and improves patient outcomes, is unsustainable. With this proposal shifting the entirety of federal costs of health care subsidies to the state and reducing federal Medicaid funding hospitals (collectively our state's largest private sector employer) and the state's entire economy are at risk. We stand firm in our belief that our state, our hospitals, and the people and communities we serve deserve better.

I am writing on behalf Holy Cross Health (Silver Spring, Md.), a member of Trinity Health (Livonia, Mi.), to encourage your continued opposition to attempts to repeal and replace the Affordable Care (ACA).

Holy Cross Health employs more than 4,100 people and, in fiscal 2017, served more than 248,000 patients. We are a mission-based organization committed to serving vulnerable populations in our community, and we have with considerable experience as a provider of people-centered care and delivery reform innovator. It is our belief that the health care coverage proposal recently released by Senators Graham, Cassidy, Heller, and Johnson (GCHJ) poses a significant threat to our patients' access to the health care coverage and services they need, as well as our ability to continue to fulfill our critically important mission. We do not believe that policies in GCHJ advance affordable, secure, and high-functioning coverage, nor do they advance beneficial delivery system reform.

Holy Cross Health and Trinity Health appreciate the diversity of opinions on the policies needed to best support accessible, affordable health care for all Americans. And while we recognize that there are insurance market issues that need to be addressed under current law, we believe that the coverage expansion and insurance reforms enacted in the ACA is benefitting many patients in our community. As such, we appreciate your efforts to ensure that congressional proposals to significantly restructure our nation's health care system receive meaningful consideration through regular legislative order and, to the greatest extent possible, include solutions that can be supported on a bipartisan basis.

As an important first step in this direction, Congress should take immediate action to provide reliable funding for the cost sharing reductions provided under current law. Regardless of the long-term fate of the ACA, addressing uncertainty around CSRs is essential to ensuring that people currently covered in the exchange do not experience a harmful disruption in their care.

Additionally, we believe there are bipartisan opportunities to address the shortcomings of the current exchange risk pool; enhance competition in states where existing plan choice is limited or non-existent; evaluate plan requirements and market rules to ensure they maintain a balance between consumer protection and affordability; and identify additional options for enhanced state flexibility and innovation. Congress should also continue its work with the Administration to support efficient payment and delivery models and identify regulatory requirements that add cost without improving care.

I appreciate your ongoing support of Holy Cross Health and the communities that we serve. We look forward to working with you to develop an improved plan that will responsibly address the long-term sustainability of our health care system, while ensuring that every American is able to access the high-quality care he or she needs.

And, we heard from Karen White who told us how her daughter with serious mental health issues is only able to live a full life because of the help which the Medicaid program is providing for her. And, we heard from Mila Johns who told us how her young daughter (also in the audience) is here today because when Ms. Johns was pregnant she had Medicaid coverage to get her the prenatal care she needed. There are countless Marylanders and millions of Americans with similar stories.

In addition, we all benefit from the Affordable Care Act's Medicaid expansion because, as reported by the Maryland Center on Economic Policy, it has resulted in big drop in uncompensated hospital care which has translated into health insurance premiums for most people going up much more slowly than before the Affordable Care Act. From fiscal year 2013 to 2015, hospital uncompensated care costs declined by approximately \$311 million. Also during this time, the average costs for group health insurance costs increased at a slower rate than before, increasing by 20 percent over the past five years (2011-2016) compared to a 31 percent increase over the prior five year period.

On behalf of the Association of People Supporting Employment First (APSE), I am writing to express our strong opposition to the Graham-Cassidy health care bill. As the only national organization with an exclusive focus on integrated employment and career advancement opportunities for individuals with disabilities, we are particularly concerned about the potential negative impact that this bill would have on people with disabilities.

The proposed bill will result in massive cutbacks in Medicaid, resulting in the loss of health coverage and community-based services, and increased risk of institutionalization. If passed, Cassidy-Graham will fail Medicaid recipients with disabilities, including resulting in the devastation of long-term employment services and supports, which are highly reliant on Medicaid funding. In fact, Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS), which includes supported employment and other long-term supports and services, are optional services under Medicaid. This means that significant cuts to Medicaid funding will result in the elimination of the systems of HCBS supports in most states, the very system of supports that have been shown to reduce costs associated with institutionalization for people with the most significant disabilities.

 Cuts to Medicaid will result in people with the most challenging disabilities being forced onto long waiting lists for services and the increased potential of institutional placement to meet their needs.

APSE has state chapters in 38 states and the District of Columbia, but has membership in all 50 states and Puerto Rico. We are deeply concerned about the cost shift to states, many of which already face significant budget challenges, as a result of the proposed bill. Under the proposed legislation, the Medicaid program would be converted to a per capita cap, whereby the Federal government would cap payments to states for most enrollees. Additionally, the caps are anticipated to grow at a rate that is slower than the projection of actual Medicaid expenditures.

States will be left with insufficient funding to meet their current obligations, and unable to support unexpected future healthcare costs such as those that result from an aging population, innovations in medical care or natural disasters. The per capita cap alone would reduce federal Medicaid spending by \$175 billion between 2020 and 2026.

As an organization that cares deeply about the overall health and well-being of people with disabilities, we also write to express our strong opposition to the Graham Cassidy bill due to the significant impact the proposed legislation will have on the tens of millions of people who rely on Medicaid to meet their basic healthcare needs. It should be noted that Medicaid is already shown to be a highly efficient and flexible system. Not only is Medicaid less costly than private insurance, but states already have great discretion to determine how they operate their programs, the services they provide and the rates they charge. The proposed cuts to the Medicaid program, as outlined in the bill, would result in states being forced to turn away individuals in need of services and, instead, focus serves on those that they are absolutely required to provide. The Graham Cassidy bill will:

- Cut billions of dollars out of services and supports people with disabilities rely on for their health and safety
- End coverage for essential health benefits, including needed mental health services
- Eliminate protections for people with preexisting conditions, allowing insurers to charge more or deny coverage
- Provide fewer consumer protections on coverage and cost
- Penalize states for spending too much money on disability services

Finally, we urge Congress to continue to work in a bipartisan manner to improve healthcare for all Americans. Moving this bill forward in such an expedited timeframe does not allow for independent analysis and understanding of its potential effects across the nation and on each state.

As Congress continues to work towards a solution to meet the diverse needs of all Americans, including those with the most significant disabilities, APSE stands ready to assist in whatever manner is helpful.

Dear Chairman Hatch and Ranking Member Wyden,

I oppose the Cassidy-Graham bill. The Affordable Care Act has saved my son's life, and I cannot support any legislation that might cause a different outcome for another family.

Our son, Elliott, is 18 months old. He was born with a rare birth defect where his esophagus did not form properly, leaving a large gap in the middle. He required surgery on Day 1 of life. On Day 6, his treatment was further complicated by a bowel rupture, resulting in him, thankfully, only losing 2-3 cm of his small intestines. His midline defect, from the esophagus malformation, means that his trachea does not function properly and he cannot recover from lung infections without hospitalization.

He spent 104 days in the NICU, and a further 61 days in the PICU in 5 additional hospitalizations over his first winter (November 2016-April 2017).

If we had paid out of pocket, we would have owed the hospital over \$2 million. Through our employee-sponsored insurance, we have only paid around \$20,000 through deductibles and co-pays, but these unexpected medical costs have greatly impacted our finances.

Here's what I ask of you. First, please do not pass a bill out of this committee or the full Senate that eliminates the restrictions on lifetime caps. If the ACA was not in effect during the past 18 months, my son would have met a likely cap of \$1 million at around 2 months, when he was still very sick and at birth weight. We are still under that insurance plan, and if Graham-Cassidy is passed, either my husband or I would be required to change jobs in order to find a plan that would even consider covering him.

Second, I ask that you not allow insurance companies to charge our family more for my son than for my healthy daughter. Insurance is a shared risk, by definition. When you buy insurance, you take the risk that you may have a catastrophic illness or accident someday, and you deserve to be covered. None of us are invincible, and we all deserve access to medical care.

And third, I ask that you maintain robust coverage for expanded Medicaid. Poor people need insurance, but not only poor people are covered by Medicaid. When my son first came home from the NICU, we desperately needed home nursing. We did not have Medicaid, however, and our private insurance did not cover home nursing. So I spent nearly two months tube feeding my son in sessions that took over 2 hours and needed to be repeated every 3 hours, while trying to keep him from vomiting the formula (to which we later found out he was allergic). These were some of my darkest days, and expert care would have saved us many mistakes from exhaustion and inexperience.

Please hear us.

Please find a bipartisan fix to the ACA. My son deserves to have affordable health care coverage as he grows up. Please don't cut off his opportunities. Please allow him and kids like him to have a fulfilling and productive life.

I respectfully request that you oppose this bill.

Senators Cassidy and Graham introduced a bill last week to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act (ACA). This bill, like previous proposals, would make huge cuts to and place caps on the Medicaid program, end the Medicaid expansion and marketplace subsidies in the ACA, and allow states to waive protections for people with pre-existing conditions. This has significant implications for those people who have brain injury and depend on Medicaid, especially if they cannot get back to their previous jobs and then lose their commercial health insurance. This bill has a real chance of being enacted and would threaten the ability of states to continue Medicaid Waivers to provide the Long Term Services and Supports that people with brain injury need.

#### What the Graham-Cassidy Bill Does:

- It eliminates the Medicaid program as we know it and ends the entitlement by placing a per-capita cap on the traditional Medicaid population and block granting funding for the expansion population until 2026. After 2026 there will be no funding for this population.
- It places the Essential Health Benefits at risk and allows states to remove covered services like rehabilitative care, opioid treatment, and mental health treatment.
- It allows insurance companies to discriminate against people with pre-existing conditions, such as brain
  injury, and all but guaranteeing these individuals will pay higher premiums, and potentially be priced out
  of the market.

I am writing to comment on the proposed Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson (GCJH) Bill to Repeal and Replace the ACA. I am opposed to the GCJH Bill on the grounds that it causes undue fear, uncertainty, and loss of healthcare coverage and protections for millions of American now covered under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. By their own admission, the framers of the bill are motivated primarily by a desire to get rid of the Affordable Care Act with little or no regard for improving healthcare coverage and services for U.S. citizens. Let me explain, from a personal perspective.

One of my nephews, now a 21-year old, was sexually abused as a young child. The emotional and physical trauma of this experience resulted in him suffering from extended periods severe depression and self-harming behaviors. This was compounded by his exhibiting symptoms of PTSD, including anxiety attacks. At the time these symptoms appeared, his father had employee healthcare insurance but it did not cover mental health issues for what was then considered a "pre-existing" condition. The family incurred huge debts (and poor credit ratings) trying to cover psychiatric and other medical costs for their son. I know this because we tried to help them financially. With the coming of ACA, my nephew received medical coverage and treatment AND is now covered by his father's insurance until he is 26 years of age. I can happily say that he has shown great progress with his mental and physical issues, all incurred through no fault of his own. And this is just one story.

On a more local level, the GCHJ Bill threatens healthcare coverage and services here in my home state of Maryland. When the ACA became the law of the land, our Governor and State Legislature saw the benefits to our citizens and participated in all aspects of the legislation. This included a state healthcare market exchange and Medicaid expansion. With all of this, Maryland added approximately 95,254 high-subsidy enrollees (2016) and 272,157 Medicaid expansion enrollees (2016) as reported by the MD State Health Department. The percentage of Marylanders not receiving healthcare coverage fell from 10% in 2012 to 6.7% in 2015 to 4.9%

this year. This is all thanks to the ACA. Now the GCHJ Bill seeks to punish states that were early adopters of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Here's a breakdown of what this bill will cost Marylanders:

- GCJH Bill Medicaid Cap: Loss to Maryland of \$981 million in funding
- GCJH Bill Block Grants: Loss to Maryland of \$1,603,000,000 in funding
- Total loss of healthcare funding and coverage to Maryland: \$2,584,000,000

How on earth can the writers of this bill have the temerity to call it a healthcare bill? In reality, it eliminates healthcare coverage for over 300,000 Marylanders and cuts existing funding for healthcare in the state by \$2.5 billion. I would argue that the GCHJ Bill is economically unsound in that it debilitates the health, finances, and morale of the American people. Invest in the health of Americans.

My story is not nearly as dramatic as many you're receiving I'm sure, but I feel you need to hear from all types of Americans, even those who are in much better circumstances than others.

I am a middle-aged woman with degrees from two top tier Universities. I made my living for over a decade running an arts organization in California, the Corita Art Center, a non-profit organization focused on arts education and the integrated use of the arts for all academic learning. I never made more than 60k, but I had health coverage from my job and was able to live a decent working class life in Los Angeles.

I left my job three years ago to become full-time caretaker for my mother, in Frederick, Maryland. My father had an aortic dissection and spent 3 months in the hospital while my mother descended into dementia, she had Alzheimer's, and I ended up moving into their home to take care of them. Thankfully, my father had great health insurance from his 20 years at the State Department and both my parents got wonderful care.

My mother died less than 1 year ago and I have not yet found steady employment. I currently substitute teach at a private school where I make less than \$500/week. I am still living with my father and paying for my own insurance. Thanks to Maryland's generous subsidies, I have been able to pay for insurance from my swiftly vanishing savings account. However, this bill will erase all that and I don't anticipate being able to pay for more than a few months of insurance given the undermining and destabilization of the ACA that's been going on for months now. If I don't find a job that pays my insurance or if for some reason my future employer is able to refuse my coverage, what then?

Moreover, I have suffered from depression and have had one irregular pap smear. I don't know if these are issues that can be cause for coverage denial, but I don't want to take that chance. I have sacrificed my life to take care of my family, something I would do again in a heartbeat. However, looking ahead at what the Graham-Cassidy bill promises, there is simply no way I will ever get the kind of care my parents got, a grim proposition as I anticipate the coming years when I will likely be faced with more health issues than in my youth.

You need to protect our healthcare and put an end to this posturing that's only hurting the American people. Set politics aside and work for all of us. We deserve the same kind of healthcare Senators themselves get, but instead we have to fight to keep the meager coverage that was passed by a bipartisan vote under President Obama. Stop using us as pawns in this political game and protect our healthcare. SAY NO TO GRAHAM-CASSIDY.

I gratefully chose a plan that worked for me, and within a few months, I had a primary care physician, a psychologist, and a therapist. I finally (finally!) treated conditions I'd neglected. I started taking anti-depressants, which kept the panic attacks at bay, allowing me to work.

My panic attacks came back as Republicans began their repeal and replace efforts. I almost lost my new job after panic attacks kept me home for an entire week. I've given up so much in order to get health care and now it's being ripped away from me. We are registered voters in Maryland with three adult children, also registered, active voters. Our youngest daughter Erin just turned 20 today (photo attached). She has Downs syndrome, hearing loss from early ear tube surgery (and now uses bi-lateral hearing aids), and scoliosis with a leg length difference significant enough to require surgery. All of which are pre-existing conditions.

Erin is a lovely young lady who graduated from high school and is receiving job training. She hopes to get a job working with children as an assistant to a teacher or daycare provider. She is a self-advocate who has been in the halls and offices of Congress, and has testified before the Maryland state legislature.

The historically in our country, support for people with disabilities was built around institutionalization. My wife and I are old enough to remember when parents receiving the diagnosis of Down syndrome for their newborn were routinely advised to place their child in an institution. Thankfully, for us, our daughter and all people with disabilities, times have changed. Institutions are closing. And society is becoming more enlightened about disability in general, and in particular, how to support people with disabilities in their communities with natural supports and the dignity of independence.

For all of us, with and without disabilities, healthcare is the linchpin to living independently and happily. For now, until universal healthcare becomes a reality, Medicaid is that linchpin for those like our daughter whose job prospects are new or limited and who cannot afford healthcare premiums. When Erin turned 18 we entered the overwhelming world of adult services, of which Medicaid is such a big part. And then to see that, as a part of the healthcare "solution," Congress is considering cuts and caps and allowing states to decide how to cover pre-existing conditions ... well, we cannot understand how people of good conscience can target the most vulnerable with cuts that will so negatively affect their health and wellbeing.

It is time to stop seeing people with disabilities as the "others," people separate from us who need to be segregated and/or pitied. "Disability is a natural part of the human experience," as stated in The U.S. Developmental Disabilities and Bill of Rights Act, could be paraphrased simply as "We are them and they are us." Whether caused by genetics, injury, accident, illness, or the natural aging process, people with disabilities are our family, our friends, and if we live long enough, ourselves.

There are countless Marylanders and millions of Americans with similar stories.

In addition, we all benefit from the Affordable Care Act's Medicaid expansion because, as reported by the Maryland Center on Economic Policy, it has resulted in big drop in uncompensated hospital care which has translated into health insurance premiums for most people going up much more slowly than before the Affordable Care Act. From fiscal year 2013 to 2015, hospital uncompensated care costs declined by approximately \$311 million. Also during this time, the average costs for group health insurance costs increased at a slower rate

"The Sisters of Mercy, who have been providing healthcare services for people who are poor and vulnerable for nearly 175 years in the U.S., believe that access to health care and adequate health insurance coverage is a fundamental human right. Rather than taking away health care for millions of Americans over the next several years, we should be finding ways to strengthen and expand health coverage and to improve affordability." -- Sister Patricia McDermott, RSM, president of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas

Sisters, lay associates and co-workers have shared some of the positive impacts of Medicaid expansion, essential benefits in insurance plans, and required coverage of persons with pre-existing conditions. These include:

- Residents of a home for women recovering from substance abuse, trauma and mental illness
  now have access to primary care physicians who are providing consistent care, and their wait
  times for initial psychiatric appointments have been reduced dramatically.
- Medicaid has allowed participants in a program for adults with mental illness to move into more independent supportive housing and to pursue employment.
- Patients without insurance and financial resources used to wait too long, when their disease trajectory was dangerous, to seek treatment at the emergency department of a big-city hospital. When people are able to enroll in Medicaid, they are able to access a primary care physician and specialists in order to be and remain well.
- A hospital social worker and nurse case manager were able to transfer a formerly uninsured, acutely mentally ill patient to a hospital in his home state, where he has family, and start the Medicaid application process to cover ongoing services.
- A public school nurse several times a month refers families to public health programs for medical care, medications, glasses or dental care that enable children to stay in school and focus on learning without concerns about their own or other family members' health.
- A young adult had a recurrence of leukemia and had to take out a bank loan to pay for testing because of his insurance plan's large deductible and large co-pays. He was able to secure a more affordable plan through the ACA marketplace to cover rounds of testing, medications and hospitalizations.

Sisters of Mercy have been sharing many similar stories as they contact their senators to urge a "no" vote on the Graham-Cassidy healthcare bill.

The National Association of School Psychologists is writing to express serious concerns that the Graham-Cassidy Proposal will jeopardize healthcare for the nation's most vulnerable children: students with disabilities and students in poverty. NASP represents over 24,000 school psychologists who work with students, parents, teachers, administrators, and communities to ensure students have the necessary supports needed to thrive at school, at home, and in life. Our members also provide a variety of school-based mental and physical health services—some of which are funded with Medicaid dollars—including prevention, early identification, and intervention services that remove barriers to learning and assist students in becoming effective learners and productive citizens. We serve all students in both general and special education settings.

We are concerned that restructuring Medicaid to a per capita cap system will undermine States' ability to provide America's neediest children access to vital healthcare necessary to ensure they are able to succeed in school and beyond. Medicaid is a cost-effective and efficient provider of essential health care services for children. School-based Medicaid programs in particular serve as a lifeline to children who can't access critical healthcare and services outside of their school. Under this bill, the bulk of the costs for health care coverage would be shifted to the States even though health needs and costs of care for children will remain the same or increase. States and local communities will have to compensate for this federal disinvestment in our children's healthcare. If they cannot adequately make up the difference in federal funding, providers will be forced to cut eligibility, services, and benefits for children.

The proposals in the American Health Care Act, as passed by the House, will disproportionately harm children's access to care, including services received at school. We urge you to work with your colleagues to ensure our nation's most vulnerable children do not lose access to the vital comprehensive health care services they need in school and in the community. A recent report from the Center on Budget Policy Priorities outlines how Medicaid benefits children in the short term and helps them make long term economic gains as adults. Protecting this program is critical.

#### Schools Provide Critical Health Care for Students

A school's primary responsibility is to provide students with a high-quality education. Children cannot learn to their fullest potential with unmet health needs. As such, specialized instructional support personnel regularly provide critical health services to ensure all children are ready to learn and able to thrive alongside their peers. Schools deliver services effectively and efficiently since school is where children spend their days. Increasing access to healthcare services through Medicaid improves health care as well as educational outcomes for

students. Providing health and wellness services for students in poverty and services that benefit students with disabilities ultimately enables more children to become employable and attend higher education.

Since 1988, Medicaid has permitted payment to schools for certain medically necessary services provided to children under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) through an individualized education program (IEP) or individualized family service plan (IFSP). Schools are thus eligible to be reimbursed for direct medical services to Medicaid-eligible students with an IEP or IFSP. In addition, districts can receive Medicaid reimbursements for providing Early and Periodic, Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment benefits (EPSDT) for Medicaid-eligible children under age 21. The goal of EPSDT is to assure health problems are diagnosed and treated as early as possible before the problems become complex and treatment is more expensive.

School districts use Medicaid reimbursement funds in a variety of ways to help support the learning and development of the children they serve. In a 2017 survey of school districts, district officials reported that two-thirds of Medicaid dollars are used to support the work of school psychologists and other specialized instructional support personnel who provide comprehensive health and mental health services to students. Districts also use these funds to expand the availability of a wide range of health and mental health services to students in poverty, who are more likely to lack consistent access to healthcare professionals. Further, some districts depend on Medicaid reimbursement to purchase and update specialized equipment (e.g., walkers, wheelchairs, exercise equipment, special playground equipment, and equipment to assist with hearing and vision), as well as assistive technology for students with disabilities to assist them in learning.

School districts would stand to lose much of their funding for Medicaid under the current proposal. Schools currently receive roughly \$4 billion in Medicaid reimbursements each year. Under the current proposal, States would no longer have to consider schools as eligible Medicaid providers, leaving districts with the same obligation to provide services for students with disabilities under IDEA, but no Medicaid dollars to provide medically-necessary services. Schools would be unable to provide EPSDT to students. Instead, screenings and treatment currently provided in school settings would have to be delivered in physicians' offices, which may be less accessible for families or in hospital emergency rooms where costs are much higher.

In summary, basic health screenings for vision, hearing, and mental health problems would no longer be possible, making these problems more difficult to address and more expensive to treat. Moving health screenings out of schools also reduces access to early identification and treatment, resulting in more costly treatment down the road.

#### The Consequences of Medicaid Per Capita Caps Will Potentially Be Devastating for Children

Significant reductions to Medicaid spending could have devastating effects on children, especially those with disabilities. Due to the underfunding of IDEA, districts rely on Medicaid reimbursements to ensure students with disabilities have access to the supports and services they need to access a free appropriate public education, as required by federal law. Potential consequences of this critical loss of funds include:

- Fewer health services: Providing comprehensive physical and mental health services in schools improves accessibility for many children and youth, particularly in high needs and hard to serve areas such as rural and urban communities. In a 2017 <u>survey</u> of school district leaders, half indicated they have recently taken steps to increase Medicaid enrollment in their districts. Reduced funding for Medicaid would result in decreased access to critical healthcare for many children and youth.
- Cuts to general education: Cuts in Medicaid funding would require districts to divert funds from other educational programs to provide the services as required under IDEA. These funding reductions could result in program eliminations in other areas of the education system.
- Job loss: Districts use Medicaid reimbursement to support the salaries and benefits of the staff performing eligible services. Sixty-eight percent of districts use Medicaid funding to pay direct salaries for health professionals who provide services for students. Cuts to Medicaid funding would impact districts' ability to maintain employment for school nurses, physical and occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, school social workers, school psychologists, and many other critical school personnel who ensure students with disabilities and other students with a variety of educational needs are able to learn.
- Fewer critical supplies: Districts use Medicaid reimbursement for critical supplies such as wheelchairs, therapeutic bicycles, hydraulic changing tables, walkers, lifts, and student-specific items that are necessary for each child to access curriculum as closely as possible to their non-disabled peers. Replacing this equipment would be difficult if not impossible without Medicaid reimbursement.
- Fewer mental health supports: Seven out of ten students receiving mental health services receive these services at school. Cuts to Medicaid would further marginalize these critical services and leave students without access to care.
- Noncompliance with IDEA: Given the failure to commit federal resources to fully fund the IDEA, Medicaid reimbursement serves as a critical funding stream to help school provide the specialized instructional supports students with disabilities need to be educated with their peers.

As the Senate begins to consider alternatives to the polices set forth by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, we urge you to carefully consider the important benefits that Medicaid, as it is currently structured, provides to our nation's most vulnerable children. Schools are often the hub of the community, and converting Medicaid to a per capita cap system threatens to significantly reduce access to comprehensive physical, mental and behavioral health care for children with disabilities and those living in poverty.

We look forward to working with you to prevent unwarranted changes to this highly effective and beneficial program. Further, we wish to express our opposition to efforts to remove mandatory coverage for the 10 categories of Essential Health Benefits, specifically mental and behavioral health care from public and private health care plans. We have a mental and behavioral health care crisis in this country, with many children and youth lacking adequate access to high quality and affordable care. Allowing states and insurance companies to deny coverage or charge exorbitant co-pays for these services will only increase barriers to care and exacerbate the difficulty in effectively preventing and treating mental and behavioral health among our nation's children and youth. We urge you to reject any proposal that seeks to deny or reduce access to mental and behavioral health care.

# WHY MEDICAID MATTIERS TO ME Personal Stories from Marylanders with Disabilities

#### Why Medicaid matters to me...

Because it supports my son.

Thirteen years ago, he was strangled by his umbilical cord during his delivery. He suffered a brain hemorrhage and was flown to Johns Hopkins Hospital NICU; he coded several times during the flight and his condition was grave. We were told to get in touch with the hospital chaplain and to prepare funeral arrangements.

Medicaid supports my son who is permanently disabled, intellectually disabled, and suffers uncontrolled seizures.

Medicaid supports my son by providing the funding for skilled caregivers to assist with his 24/7 care

Medicaid supports my son who requires \$500.00 of diaper supplies every 30 days Medicaid supports my son who requires \$1500.00 a month in medications to try to control his seizures

Medicaid supports my son because regular insurance won't

Medicaid supports my son because it allows for him to live with his family, at home with his dog and two cats. It supports him to be a part of a family and a bigger community, to develop supports and a quality of life that otherwise he would not have.

Medicaid supports ME: I am a single parent, trying my best to balance his care and working full time. Without the supports he receives through Medicaid, we would face crippling medical expenses and lack of skilled care; critical needs which I can not financially absorb. Losing Medicaid would bankrupt us, we would have a bigger problem of homelessness, needing welfare and social assistance.

With the push to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act and cap the spending limit for Medicaid, the short-sighted attempt will result in long-term, far-reaching detrimental consequences.

#### Why Medicaid matters to me...

My 34-year year old son, Ray Willse, has autism. He became eligible for Medicaid when he turned 18 and has depended on his team of doctors and professionals who accepted Medicaid. When he turned 21 and left the public school system, the Medicaid Waiver made it possible for him to be placed in a wonderful nonprofit agency that specializes in young adults who have autism. Through this agency, Itineris, Ray has had a number of volunteer and paid positions. He works independently in these positions and is very happy. Itineris not only provides training and job support, but also works on social skills and daily skills of living. An emphasis on healthy activities such as sports, yoga and outdoor activities has built up Ray physically so now he is in great shape.

If Ray were to lose his Medicaid funding and could no longer be served by Itineris, his world would collapse, and ours would too. We are both senior citizens now and need the support that Itineris and Medicaid provides. Medically, Ray is on Medicare and depends on Medicaid as his secondary insurance. He sees specialists regularly about a rare medical condition which could affect his eyesight.

We are hopeful that Ray will eventually have a paid position that would allow him to be a contributing member of our state and national economy. All of this job training, social skills training and experience is provided to him through Medicaid.

#### Why Medicaid matters to me and my son...

My 29-year-old son gets Medicaid as a benefit with his SSI. He has Asperger's Syndrome and also suffers from depression, to the point where he won't leave the house for any reason except his doctor appointments, and sometimes to the point where he won't leave the house for months on end.

Without Medicaid, he would be unable to afford to visit the psychiatrist and therapist, and he would be unable to afford his five prescription medications that cost hundreds of dollars each month, all of which currently keep him stable. He would be back in a mental health hospital (he's been in Sheppard Pratt, GBMC psych holding unit, St. Joseph's Hospital in-patient psych unit, and Midtown Hospital's in-patient psych unit), which would cost astronomically more than his Medicaid (a year ago, it was a minimum of \$1000 per day JUST for the hospital, plus medications, the doctor and therapist sessions, and fortunately was covered by his Medicaid).

Please don't take away or change any Medicaid benefits. Right now, I have an adult son who is a somewhat competent and happy person. Without Medicaid, he would be relegated to a mental health hospital, or possibly homeless.

#### Why Medicaid matters to me...

My daughter, Callie was diagnosed with Autism/PDD at age 5. We waited six years to receive Autism Waiver services. And I must say that if she had not received those services, we would have probably been homeless. I worked three part time jobs so that I could be with her when she was not at school. Care givers were too expensive and very hard to find. After the waiver services were approved we had staff that could work about 20 hours per week.

This enabled me to keep my job in the county schools and provide us with health insurance. This was her primary insurance and the medicaid health was and still is secondary. The in-home supports were what kept our small family off of any other state assistance. She is now 24. She receives day services with a local agency and is transported to and from. She is also receiving DDA CSLA (in home supports) since she is over 21. The staff helps her with life skills, behavior issues and takes her into the community at least a few times per week. She now is ready for more independence and wants to live in a group home. I have been looking, but it's pretty clear to me that it won't be happening anytime soon. They are all full and I've been told that openings, pretty much, don't happen until someone dies or moves out of the area.

Being her sole caregiver has taken a toll on my health at this time and the services she receives gives me some space and a chance to have a few hours to take care of other responsibilities and our home.

These services are crucial to help keep individuals, families and care givers from financial ruin and from becoming ill or so burnt out that they can't function. Most of the time I don't even know how I'm doing it, but I am, have been and will continue to.

My most fearful thought is what her life will be like down the road. I am only trying to give her experiences, support and love for now and the services she receives through the DDA are the only thing that has helped make life a litter better for her and for me as her caregiver.


Please do not reduce or stop these services for the individuals that are not able to fend for themselves. I feel sure that without help I would not be able to care for her and survive.

#### Why Medicaid matters to us...

We have two adult children with disabilities that are very dependent on Medicaid Funds in several different ways.

Matthew, our oldest at 26, who has Cerebral Palsy, has medical assistance for his insurance, but also has self-directed services under the Medicaid Community Pathways Waiver. Matthew has numerous medical needs and without Medical Assistance (Medicaid), his needs would never be met. We actually do have private insurance through my husband's employer as well, but our deductible is large, as are our copays. Since Matthew has had expensive surgeries, has many doctor appointments and many specialized equipment needs, it would be very difficult for us to make all the copays and meet the deductible and out of pocket expenses. They also deny many things, such as specific prescription medications and durable medical equipment. Medical assistance has enabled us to provide the medical care Matthew needs to stay healthy and have a longer life expectancy.

Matthew also receives supports through self-directed services under the Community Pathways waiver. These supports include staff that teach Matthew skills, keep Matthew safe, take Matthew out into the community, and respite care that allows my husband and I to have some time alone and Matthew to have some time away from his parents (after all, he is 26!!). Without these services, Matthew would waste away without the interaction with others that he loves. I would not be able to work since I would have to be available 24 hours, 7 days per week to take care Matthew. I'm not sure how long we would have been able to keep Matthew home since I have had back and other health problems from lifting and caring for Matthew all these years.

Our youngest son is Carson. He is turning 21 in May and he has Autism. Carson currently receives services under the Autism Waiver. He has staff that work with him after school each day, teaching him how to communicate, how to control his temper, and how to manage activities of daily life. Under the Autism Waiver, we have also been able to put a fence out back and special locks on our doors so Carson would not elope. During the summer, while school was out, we used respite under the Waiver so that I could still work each day. When Carson turns 21, his Autism Waiver services will end. He will then, hopefully, start a day program under the Community Pathways Waiver. Unfortunately, he will lose the respite and some other services. But we are fortunate to have had the services we have had. Carson controls his temper better than before, he can cook some meals on his own, he can tell us he has a headache, and can even carry on a brief conversation with others. And, again, I have been able to keep my job.

We had always planned to retire and move to Florida or somewhere down south, where it would be less expensive to live. When we started planning, we realized that every state but 2 has a waiting list for services for people with disabilities. Maryland's waiting lists is over 8,000 people. Calling

many of the states to verify, we were told that waiting list were generally at least 10 years long. There was no way that I could care for my two adult children without services. So, we have decided (there really wasn't a choice) to stay in MD. We fear what will happen to our boys when we die, so we decided we had to buy something that they could live in now and after we are gone. We are trying to downsize our house and then hope to buy a condo for our boys to share and a small house for us nearby. But the only way the boys will ever live on their own is with staff. Buying a condo will already stretch our finances in our retirement years, we certainly can't afford staff as well. We were counting on Waiver funding for services if we were providing the housing. If that funding is not available, they will live with us until we die. When we do die, they won't be able to afford the house we lived in and won't be able to manage without supports. And without funding, where would they live -in a nursing home, an institution? Then, not only will they have to deal with our deaths, they will be uprooted and moved somewhere else, into a scary environment. How traumatic.

Without federal Medicaid funding and mandates, or decreases in Medicaid funding and mandates, the present and the future for our children looks bleak and scary. These are not people that can always speak up or cause a stink like other groups that are affected by these changes can. This is not "fixing" anything. Please don't do this to our children.

#### Why Medicaid matters to me...

I am the father of a special needs teenager on the Autistic Spectrum. We are extremely concerned about the current debates regarding cuts to Medicaid. Our son Michael is critically reliant upon Medicaid to help him manage even the most basic aspects in his daily life. My wife and I are postgraduate educated professionals working in speech therapy and a technology related field respectively. We are productive, tax paying members of society who recognize our responsibility in caring for our son, but with the egregious expenses associated with dealing with this very difficult medical condition (which recently included a \$2,400 annual deductible for just one of his multiple medications) we physically do not have the financial ability to meet all of Michael's medical needs without the crucial assistance Medicaid provides. My son requires Applied Behavioral Analysis therapy as well as highly specialized education services (he attends the Kennedy Krieger Institute's Fairmount School in Baltimore as there is no appropriate public school setting for his profound disabilities). Due to significant speech disabilities, he has had to rely on augmentative speech devices (that are not covered by insurance) his entire life. We annually spend many tens of thousands of dollars on providing the most basic of medical and therapeutic supports for Michael, but the great majority of these necessities are not sufficiently covered (if they are covered at all) by traditional insurance (which we already have and employ whenever expenses are allowed by our insurer Blue Cross Blue Shield). The loss of Medicaid support will very likely impact our ability to continue to have both of us working, and will ironically lead to us providing less taxes to the government and even less to support our son.

As a concerned two concerned parents who have literally dedicated our lives and all of our family resources to caring for our Autistic son, we implore you in the strongest terms possible to not allow the currently debated Medicaid cuts to be enacted. In a multi trillion dollar budget, it is illogical as it is cruel to not see the impacts these cuts will have on the most vulnerable members of our society.

I am more than willing to meet and discuss our plea here enclosed at any time. Thank you for your consideration.

#### Why Medicaid matters to me...

My son's chance at a normal life was destroyed by a massive seizure disorder when he was 5 months old. He is now 38 years old, and he lives with us. He still has occasional seizures, and he cannot be left alone. It has been 38 years since I have been able to leave my home for any purpose, work or leisure, without making childcare arrangements.

When my son aged out of the school system at 21, he began attending a day program that offers him the opportunity to do simple work and socialize with others. Medicaid pays half of the cost of that program. It covers the cost of the 6 medications my son takes daily to prevent seizures. In addition, it funds group homes for people with disabilities who no longer have families.

I am 70 years old; my husband is 75. We are one of about 4000 families in my state hoping to get a group home placement for our son before we die. The massive cut in Medicaid proposed by the Trump administration will only add thousands more families to that endless waiting list. We have no assurance from anyone that someone will take care of our son when we are gone. Millions of other people with disabilities and their families face the same challenges. We literally do not dare die. I hope that wiser, more compassionate people will prevail and defeat the inhumane and cruel AHCA and devise a budget that takes into account the legitimate needs of our most vulnerable citizens. Please help us.

Dear Senators Graham, Cassidy, and other Senators voting on this bill,

My name is Kimberly Nicholls. Almost nine years ago I gave birth to my darling daughter, Kailyn Gibson after a 25 week pregnancy. She weighed 1 pound, 14ounces or 870 grams and was given a 50% chance of survival. She could not breath on her own and needed immediate intubation. She could not even produce her own red blood cells and needed more transfusions than I could number. I was told that private insurance would not cover the cost of her medical needs, and that I needed to give up my job and go on Medicaid. It was an agonizing decision, but I did it. My daughter had a four month NICU stay with the best of care. When she was discharged, we had in home therapists through the Infants and Toddlers program and a Medical Team at Georgetown University hospital that oversaw my child's needs. She did Outpatient Therapy in multiple disciplines at the Kennedy Krieger Institute for three years. She did inpatient eating disorders clinic at Mount Washington Pediatric hospital. My eight and a half year old daughter has a medical record that is over 235 pages long. You could say, she is a shining example of why insurance companies cannot take the risk and burden of insuring people with pre existing medical conditions. You could say the medical costs of her first few years of life are more than three healthy adults. You could say the costs of providing for disabled children like her are draining the State resources unnecessarily. But this is not where my daughter's story ends.

She is diagnosed with Celiac Disease, Anaphylactic allergies, Dyspraxia, Dysarthria, Dyslexia/Dysgraphia, Sensory Disorder, Hypotonia, and Hyperactivity, but she is also a straight A student at Divine Peace Lutheran School in Upper Marlboro, MD. She only returns to Kennedy Krieger for yearly re-evaluations. She takes gymnastics at the Wayne Curry Sports and Learning Complex, originally as a way to support physical therapy through Inclusion Services. She studies ballet, tap, hip-hop, and jazz at Marcellus Dance School. She plays piano at Bach 2 Rock Music Academy in Bethesda, MD and Music Theater Courses at Imagination Stage, Bethesda. This year she received a scholarship to participate in the Miss United States Pageant. She'll be competing for Little Miss Maryland this March. My daughter thrives and has goals of being a paralympian. She is so proud to wear her Country's colors. When she grows up, my daughter wants to be a Broadway Star. It will be amazing for a child with a neuromuscular disorder, physical disability, and speech disorder to grace the Great White Way. But should she be denied the right to become a productive citizen of the Country she loves because her birth weight is automatically considered a life long impairment? Should her ability to gain employment be determined by her diagnoses?

Passage of the Graham-Cassidy act would do something seven medical conditions and a fifty fifty chance of survival could not; kill my daughter's chance at a bright future. If medical insurance companies are allowed to price my daughter out of services, she will not be able to manage her conditions and would be left with only Medicaid as an option for affordable, accessible health coverage. But Medicaid has severe income limits; it would doom her to poverty and leave her unable to achieve her dreams. The Graham-Cassidy act also seeks to defund Medicaid, shrinking access to Medical care for those who need it after denying them the ability to seek private insurance to cover their costs. It is unfair for children like my daughter who battle and overcome their disabilities everyday to be told by Congress they don't deserve the right to pursue life, liberty, and happiness because the cost of their health is too great.

Senators, I implore you to strike down the Graham-Cassidy act and any health care act that seeks to take access to medical coverage away from Americans. Any citizen wishing to gain the unalienable rights put forth in Our Constitution must first be healthy and ensured that the cost of keeping them healthy will not bankrupt their efforts. Access to healthcare is the catalyst for success and it should be available to all if we are to hold ourselves to the principles of democracy and banish elitism. On behalf of my daughter, and all kids with disabilities please vote no on this bill today.

I am writing to you at this time to share 2 stories about how the ACA has helped my son and myself. I am also writing to let you know as a constituent I am AGAINST this bill.

My son Donnie was born with Autism Spectrum Disorder and has secondaries of Tactile Defenses, Sensory Integration Disorder, Petite Mal Seizures, Sensory Processing Disorder, Hypersensitive Hearing Disorder, Scoliosis and receives weekly Immunotherapy for his many many allergies. He will have lifelong expenses medically that he relies on his Medicaid to cover. Without this coverage he won't be able to afford his medications, he won't be able to afford to see his team of physicians and this will be an extreme hardship on not only him but myself if this bill passes.

As for myself I have all of these DX's: Learning Disabled, Dyslexic, Grand Mal Seizure Disorder, Sleep Disorder Non Specified Not Sleep Apnea, Fibromyagia, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, Irritable Bowel Syndrome, Diverticulosis, Lumbar Spondylosis with Radiculopathy, Bilateral Sacroiliac Joint Dysfunction, Osteoarthritis of the Spine, Neuropathy, Pre-Diabectic, I receive weekly Immunotherapy for all of my many allergies, am preparing to start Physical Therapy again soon and have to be tested for a rare disease called Hereditary ATTR Amyloidosis (Formerly Called Familial Amyloidosis, Harne's Disease, Pryor's Disease, etc....) that runs in my family and can be traced back to the 1800's. I too do receive Medicaid through the ACA and without this in place I won't be able to see my physicians, afford my physicians, afford my medications and I won't be able to function properly. I will be one of the many that applies for Disability if this bill goes into place. I haven't filed for Disability yet for myself because I want to get better, I do not wish to get worse to the point where I cannot function. I am also tiring of these hateful posts from persons I see on facebook that want to lump all of the Medicaid people together as being lazy, milking the system, etc....

My son is by no means lazy, he is out with his Supported Employment staff looking for work ever since he was laid off over 1 year ago. I by no means am not lazy, our PCP actually doesn't even want for me to work because of how much care 24/7 my son requires BUT I actually do work part time for a small family owned local business....BUT I work from home that way I can be available for my son at the drop of a hat. I set my own hours around my son's needs, when I have to go to the actual Office Location I am permitted to bring my son with me if need be. I also volunteer year round for Special Olympics of Maryland/Washington County as an Assistant Bocce Coach, Assistant Duckpin Bowling Coach, Duckpin Bowling Holiday Party Committee, Duckpin Bowling Awards Banquet Committee, Have to take various online/in person classes to keep up my certifications to be a part of the Special Olympics of Maryland/Washington County Community, Chaperone 3 to 4 Clients every Saturday during Duckpin Season for 2 to 3 hours, Chaperone Bocce Athletes during Season Practices/Qualifiers/Summer Games in Towson MD, Participate each year with my son in these sports through Special Olympics of Maryland/Washington County: Bocce, Duckpin Bowling, Snowshoeing, Annual Torch Run and we attempt to add a different sport every few years. Some of them have had severe accidents and had to have public insurance because they cannot work while recovering. Some have been hard working Americans who got caught up in the opioid crisis and need public insurance while they work on their recovery. Some are the working poor who receive no insurance through their employers. Almost all of my clients are working hard at recovering from their mental health challenges. I'm proud of them and honored to work with them.

My own brother had severe developmental disabilities and relied on Medicaid insurance most of his adult life. He was unable to hold a job or earn an income because he was completely disabled by his cerebral palsy, deafness, and intellectual disabilities.

I'm concerned that if the Congress were to cut Medicaid funding, Americans like my clients and my brother will be unable to afford health care and mental health assistance. This would result in overwhelming consequences for us as a nation, in human suffering and in financial costs, both to families and government at all levels. We can't afford to abandon these people. Prior to the implementation of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, my sister injured her back and was unable to continue to work as an aide in a residential home for disabled adults. She subsequently lost her job and, with it, her health insurance. When she tried to obtain health insurance on her own she found that, not only was it too expensive, but her back injury was considered a pre-existing condition and would not be covered.

When the PPACA was implemented, my sister and I sat down together and navigated our way through the signup process. We found health coverage for her that would meet her needs but, because she was unemployed, it was not affordable. Fortunately for her, she was able to obtain a subsidy that brought the monthly premium down to a level that she could afford. We signed her up, she got the coverage, she went to a doctor, and got physical therapy and other treatment. Within three months she was working again, and even though her new job did not include health benefits, she was able to keep the health coverage she had through the PPACA because the premiums were within her reach.

For the millions of Americans with stories like my sister, I'm asking you to table the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson proposal. Work with the full Senate to create legislation to fix the problems with the PPACA or create a replacement that covers more people with the same or greater levels of coverage.

Dear Senators,

I am writing to express my wish that the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson Proposal be voted down.

This bill will have a serious negative impact on our family. Both of my daughters have pre-existing conditions. Under this proposed bill, they would both be at risk of paying higher premiums. As both are fairly young and still in entry-level, lower wage positions, this has the potential to severely hinder their ability to finish their education, buy a home, and invest for their retirement. My youngest child has also been diagnosed with depression and anxiety and requires ongoing medication and counseling, none of which come inexpensively. Without the guarantee to coverage for mental health benefits, I fear that she would not continue to get the help she needs. Before her treatment stabilized her, she twice attempted suicide. I fear that without treatment, the depression will succeed.

My husband, a veteran of the US Navy, US Air Force Reserves and US Army Reserves, also has ongoing health issues. During his active duty tour immediately following 9/11, he developed a blood clot in his lower leg and was on blood thinners for almost 15 years. The condition left him with permanent blood valve damage in his legs and he now lives daily in pain. Should the blood clot reoccur, I fear that it could be considered a result of pre-existing conditions and then he, too, would no longer have the protections provided under the Affordable Care Act.

My brother-in-law was born legally blind and needs recurring surgeries to maintain the little eyesight that he has. In addition, he was been diagnosed with Type-1 diabetes and lives with an insulin pump. Should the lifetime caps that existed prior to the ACA be restored, he would quickly reach his limits and be unable to continue his medications.

One year ago, my brother needed open heart surgery and continues to need medical care to ensure that he stays healthy. He, too, could easily find himself uninsurable.

I could continue on, but I know that there are many other folks who would be in much worse situations should the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson pass. Please do not send our healthcare backwards.

My name is Katrina Foreman and I urge you to vote **NO** on the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson Health Care Proposal. I am a social worker working in an inner city. I am particularly concerned about the impact the bill will have on people with mental health or substance use disorders. I oppose the bill for the following reasons:

It allows states to drop the requirement to cover mental health or substance use care. Today, Exchange plans are required to cover essential health benefits, which include treatment for mental health and substance use conditions. Under this bill, each state will have the freedom to drop or change these requirements, putting mental health and substance use benefits at risk.

It shifts Medicaid funding to a "per capita cap" system. Shifting to per capita cap funding (a fixed amount of funding per person) may sound reasonable, but would not keep up with growth in costs and needs. This would result in states being forced to cut Medicaid services and eligibility, which would harm children and adults with mental illness.

It effectively ends Medicaid expansion. One in three people covered by Medicaid expansion plans lives with a mental health or substance use condition. Under this bill, Medicaid expansion would be converted to a smaller, temporary block grant that states could use for health coverage or any other health purpose, with no guarantee of mental health or substance use coverage.

It reduces help to purchase health insurance. Block grants would provide a fixed amount of temporary federal funding to replace insurance subsidies, severely cutting federal help for people to buy insurance. This will leave many people unable to afford the coverage they need for mental health or substance use treatment.

What that means is that once a week all day I meet with families who are carrying pregnancies with babies with significant, often severe, sometimes lethal birth defects. These babies are born critically ill, needing life saving ICU care and surgeries. They have abnormal hearts, brains, kidneys, limbs, faces. Their parents love them, and choose to bring them into this world assuming they will be able to do everything that they can to keep them safe. For other families, this devastating diagnosis means an end to their journey, and they decide to end their pregnancies, often to avoid the pain and suffering likely to occur when a baby is born with a severe birth defect. Either way, these families and children ARE "pre-existing conditions" from literally the moment of birth. We know that when children have access to preventive services the overall health care costs go down. If we want to improve health spending in the future, we need to intervene in childhood. So instead of cutting billions of dollars, the senate should invest in children and create a health system that works to maximize wellness and prevent future costs. Additionally, this bill removes the requirement for coverage of essential benefits. Not only will Medicaid kids lose, but all kids because their mother's won't have access to prenatal care which will lead to an increased number of premature infants. Dear Chairman Hatch and distinguished members of the Committee, I am writing to urge you to reject the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson proposal to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

I am fortunate enough to have decent health insurance. I bought it when both my husband I were perfectly healthy and have been fortunate enough to have only had to use it a few times over the course of decades. Once was when I broke my arm after getting kicked by a horse.

The second time was when I was diagnosed with uterine cancer. I hope you never have to hear that word uttered about you or a family member. It was a terrible phone call that I will never forget. But, I was fortunate in having reasonably priced health insurance that enabled me to concentrate on finding the best care and on my recovery and not on how I was going to pay for it. And my premiums didn't increase nor did I get kicked off my insurance because of this diagnosis.

And now my husband is dealing with squamous cell carcinoma of the tongue. Once again, because of decent, affordable, health insurance, he is recovering nicely because we didn't have to worry about how to finance his treatment.

But now, we both have pre-existing conditions. With this current proposal, we are at high risk of either losing our coverage completely or having the premiums be too expensive. And, because we are in our sixties, we will be penalized because of our age as well. And, if I read the proposal correctly, insurance companies would be able to increase my premium at any time, if either my husband and I would have something else go wrong.

There isn't a family out there who hasn't been affected by cancer, either directly or indirectly. How can this committee justify denying people access to health care because they were unfortunate to have been diagnosed with any type of cancer? Or families whose babies have to spend the first days or months of their lives in the NICU and will reach their lifetime cap before their first birthday? How is this proposal a hallmark of

compassionate conservatism? How is this proposal making sure that the American people will have access to affordable health care without be penalized because of our gender, our age, or any pre-existing conditions?

I worked for over thirty years in the biomedical research field. I believe strongly that a healthy population is the key to a thriving country that still will be that "shining city on the hill". If funding for research to improve health care is cut, along with denying access to affordable health care, then this country will begin a slow spiral to insignificance in this world. I refuse to let that happen.

If this committee lets this proposal go forward, I would hope that each member who votes for this will have the courage of their convictions to go to cancer wards and NICU wings at hospitals around the country, look people in the eye, and explain to them why their access to affordable health care is being denied.

Do the right thing, Chairman Hatch, and urge your committee to reject this draconian proposal. Is the Affordable Health Act perfect? No. But don't dismantle it, just so your Republican colleagues can say they repealed it. Have them go back to the drawing board, work with the Democrats, and come up with something that will benefit all of our citizens, not the insurance companies.

I am writing to express my concern over your proposed bill. Already I am aware that rising rates in Maryland will mean I can no longer afford the health care I have, and I only just got off Medicaid and onto Blue Cross Blue Shield last fall.

Three years ago, my husband went to Afghanistan as a contractor for a security company. He came back and asked for a divorce. We divorced, and with that I had to find my own health care. I was lucky to live in a jurisdiction that allowed me to go on Medicaid. In that time I had a medical emergency -- my first ER visit ever! I'm 46 and in excellent health. But sometimes, genetics get the best of you, according to my gynecologist. I got treated and never missed a day of work. Last fall, I was financially comfortable enough to get off Medicaid, and purchased a plan on the ACA exchange. I get some help with my monthly bill. As a small business owner, I can't emphasize enough how helpful this support is. I live and work in Baltimore, rehabbing vacant houses. I know the work I do is important to this city, but the financial rewards are minimal. A supportive health care system can go a long way, beyond just the individual on the receiving end. If I am healthy, I can keep working and paying the contractors who do the work for me. They support themselves and their families, and we all pay into health care. The system we have needs attention, but we do not need to abolish it. Not having Medicaid when I needed it would have had disastrous consequences for me. I would not be where I am today: contributing and participating in a robust working economy.

Please don't repeal the ACA! Don't do it!

Dear Honorable Members of the Senate Finance Committee:

My name is Paul Foster. I am a physician in Baltimore, Maryland. I have many reasons underlying my belief that the Graham-Cassidy Healthcare bill is catastrophic medically and economically, and that the effects will be immediate and far-reaching. I will leave those arguments for others. I am not even writing as a physician who has directly witnessed the life-saving impact of the Affordable Care Act. I am writing as a brother.

My brother, William Foster, is brilliant and disabled. He has suffered from severe bipolar disorder since his teenage years. Because of Medicaid and later the Affordable Care Act, my brother obtained a Ph.D. in Information Sciences, traveled to China to study their use of the internet, assisted multiple national security groups to assess the Chinese capacity in cyberwarfare, and taught multiple students about the importance of understanding the international impact of the internet. He has more than paid the country back for his intermittent hospitalizations and expensive medications. His life has not been an easy one and there have been significant bumps in his career. Nevertheless, he has been able to make a significant contribution to this country based primarily on his ability to obtain health care. I have no doubt that my brother would have been homeless or died of neglect without these systems, while extending the already crippling expenses for the family. Our national security would have suffered accordingly.

Recently, my brother's illness has progressed to the point where he has become fully disabled. This means he will have some health security through Medicare. Nevertheless, he retains skills and an ability to contribute that he has acquired during the years of the ACA which he would not otherwise have had.

For the sake of preserving crucial national resources hidden among our disabled and disadvantaged, similar to my brother's prior situation, please turn down this ill-thought-out solution. The block grant process pretends to put the social and economic cost for this bill off for several years. The loss of pre-existing condition coverage will immediately push people like my brother out of the private insurance system, and cuts to Medicaid will limit their ability to obtain preventive care and limit exacerbations. As they become critically ill they will fill our emergency rooms, and the price of that care will be higher. With increased uncompensated care, hospitals will raise rates and transfer costs to the private insurance pool. That same pool will have shrunk because without the ACA mandate, many people will stop paying premiums. Without the ACA's quality and cost incentives, we will see cost hyperinflation. Any brief, premium relief will vanish in a shockwave of disruption.

Your committee has an extraordinary responsibility to protect our tax dollars -- the attractions of this bill are somewhat like a pretty



Dear Senate Finance Committee,

My name is Dr. Jennifer Cowart. I am a hospitalist physician in Jacksonville, Florida. I am writing in opposition to the proposed Graham-Cassidy bill to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act.

As a physician, I take care of all types of patients in the hospital, including those with and without insurance. Some of my patients are on Medicare and/or Medicaid. Some have private insurance from employment or via the ACA exchange.

The ones I have to worry about for treatment are the ones without insurance coverage. I can't get them medicines unless I can prescribe something on the \$4 list at Walmart. I can get them urgent treatment in the hospital, but I can't get them long-term treatment. I recently cared for a woman without insurance, losing her vision from cancer. She needed urgent radiation therapy to save her eyesight--and I couldn't get it for her. The ER and the hospital do not give chemo to cancer patients. We don't give long-term insulin prescription to diabetic patients. We are there to stabilize and send you on your way.

Graham-Cassidy will make the uninsured problem much, much worse. Millions of people will lose coverage. My state, Florida, is third in terms of funding losses under this bill. Our governor has declared an emergency for the opioid epidemic; we recently suffered a tremendous hurricane. Cutting Medicaid and exchange funding in the setting of emergencies is both fiscally irresponsible and cruel.

The ACA has obvious problems. The rising premiums, the single-insurer counties, the coverage gap in non-Medicaid expansion states--those issues are all real, and not solved by Graham-Cassidy. Our healthcare system at large has continued problems of high costs and poor outcomes. Our resources are vast but poorly matched to needs. Doctors are saddled with ever-higher student loan debt, administrative burdens, and system fragmentation. Primary care and mental health are grossly undervalued and stretched thin. Drug costs and hospital fees are high. None of these systemic problems are solved by Graham-Cassidy.

I urge the Senate to stop this madness. Hold real hearings. Have actual debate. Write small bills that fix a few problems at a time. Aim for bipartisan reforms, such as Collins-Nelson's Reinsurance Act of 2017. Aim for 60 votes. Let the American people weigh in on the revision of our system. Graham-Cassidy is the wrong direction.

I am writing as a concerned citizen from Maryland who does not wish to see the Affordable Care Act (ACA) repealed, not only because of the accessibility to quality healthcare it affords to women and working mothers like myself, but because of the lifesaving impacts it has granted to people in my immediate circle who suffer from preexisting conditions and rely on access to affordable insurance to be able to keep head above water financially.

My personal perspective is that, while the ACA is imperfect, it is increasingly proving its value as a healthcare solution for those states that have embraced it and applied for the medicaid expansion. Those states that have denounced it, claiming its imminent failure as motivation to repeal it, all seem to have in common a total refusal to participate in the aspects of the ACA designed to ease the burden on the common taxpayer. In essence, those states have sabotaged it at the state level and claimed that the ACA itself is to blame.





To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing as a concerned citizen currently residing in Maryland (21230) and originally from Indiana (46228) who does not support the Graham-Cassidy Healthcare Proposal.

My younger brother benefited from the ACA while living in Illinois. It allowed him to quit his job at Caterpillar and work for himself while teaching himself coding skills before going back to school to earn a masters degree in Data Science. Although he was in his 20s, like many Americans he has a pre-existing condition and likely would not have been able to obtain or afford insurance on the individual market before the ACA, or under the proposed bill. He would have been locked into a job at a company that offers health insurance and his health would have been at risk if he had lost that job.

A close friend had a son born prematurely at the end of July who has the same birth defect as Jimmy Fallon's son, Tetralogy of Fallot. Very fortunately they are covered by health insurance now, but her son has several pre-existing conditions and will require expensive medical care for the rest of his life, through no fault of his own. He is not protected by the current bill, should his parents lose health insurance (or when he ages out).

States should not have the flexibility to waive rules regarding pre-existing conditions, putting Americans' health at risk. All Americans are at risk of needing healthcare at any given time, and all Americans should therefore have access to affordable health insurance. If they do not, the result may be higher mortality (see for example Woolhandler and Himmelstein 2017) and less entrepreneurship and job growth as individuals remain locked into jobs that offer group insurance.

Graham-Cassidy would also result in major reductions to Medicaid, which remains the first line of defense for children with complex medical needs and in states that suffer from the opioid epidemic. To say that this bill seems to be punishing our most vulnerable people for the sake of "winning" is an understatement. And a host of organizations devoted to improving healthcare agree, including the AMA, as well as both Republican and Democratic governors.

Although the ACA is flawed and needs to be fixed to improve the health of the nation, the proposed bill would leave Americans worse off.

The majority of Americans stand with the ACA. So should Congress. Thank you for your time and attention to this matter.

My name is Jill Messier and my son Christopher is now 22 years old. Christopher was a big (9lb 7oz) beautiful, full term baby. My water broke and he was born 26 hours later. I pushed for 3 1/2 hours. When he came out, he was in cardiac arrest and covered with meconium! He was in arrest for 8 minutes. They weren't able to intubate him in the room. He wasn't actually intubated until he got to the NICU. Needless to say, he suffered severe anoxia! He went into multi organ failure and 6 hours after birth he began to seize. He seized for 2 hours. Once the seizures stopped, he went into a coma. He was in a coma for 2 weeks. He remained in the NICU for 1 month. A CT scan of his brain 1 day after birth showed a normal brain. One month after birth, the CT scan of his brain showed catastrophic loss of brain tissue. That space was filled with water! Discharge was delayed, because he wasn't thermoregulating his body temperate. The anoxia had destroyed his hypothalamus! To this day, 22 years later, he still doesn't regulate his body temp. We do it for him!! When he gets cold in winter his temp goes down to 93.5. When he gets that cold his heart rate drops as low as 35 beats per minute. We constantly monitor his temp and warm him with an electric blanket or cool him in the heat of summer with cool rags. His temp has gone up to 102 degrees when outside in 100 degree weather for 5 minutes! When Christopher was about 4 months old, I began to suspect problems with his vision. We later found out that he is cortically blind. The anoxia had destroyed his optic nerve. Christopher is nonverbal. In fact he has never even cried. When he was an infant, I had to set an alarm during the night so he could be fed. He would call out to me on his own. He was on an apnea monitor, but it constantly alarmed, because it couldn't pick up Christopher's reduced respiratory effort. My 3 year old daughter would go into another room and scream, because the constant screaming of the alarm was terrifying. Christopher missed all of the normal developmental milestones. He has no head control, has never rolled, never crawled, never walked, and is still in diapers today. By the end of his first year, he had already been hospitalized for aspiration pneumonia. He went on to have more aspirations and at age 2 was given a gastrostomy tube. He has been completely tube fed since the age of 2.

When Christopher was 3 months old, I had to go back to work (end of maternity leave). It was extremely challenging, stressful, and expensive finding daycare that could manage all of his needs. Thankfully, a new special needs daycare had opened near me. Unfortunately, it cost twice as much as a normal daycare. I had to go back to work so we had insurance! It was an extremely frightening time!

Over the years, Christopher has had numerous aspiration, usually from secretions in his head. A basic cold, was life threatening! He was intubated and airlifted to Hopkins Children's Center numerous time. Each stay in the PICU lasted at least 1 month. On a few occasions, they told me he wouldn't survive. Christopher is a fighter and managed to pull through. He has had 2 surgeries, but each one resulted in pneumonia from the anesthesia.

I had worked at my job for many years, but there had been problems and it became toxic. I wasn't able to leave and look for another job, because Christopher had preexisting conditions. The stress was immense and I became ill. I have degeneration of my spine and the constant lifting of my son caused my back to breakdown. I myself had to have multiple surgeries. Caring for Christopher during this time became extremely difficult!! We were told about the model waiver program which would allow Christopher to go onto Medicaid. With his Medicaid, we were able to get in home nursing help. This was quite a relief! Until this point, I had been sleeping on the floor, next to his bed, so I could hear him when he would have trouble. Around the age of 14, Christopher had a devastating aspiration while in his classroom. He suffered even more anoxia! This hospitalization was touch and go! He made it through, but I lost a little more of him. It was also discovered that his thyroid and adrenal glands weren't functioning properly. He was given a sleep study and found to have significant sleep apnea. He was put on bipap while sleeping (bipap forces pressure in and then out, it also forces air in when he doesn't breath). After that he also began using vest therapy and a cough assist. The vest moves

secretions out of the lungs and the cough assist moves secretions out of the upper airways. This helps with keeping his lungs clearer. He requires frequent suctioning (oral, nasal, and deep) Christopher has no gag, cough, or swallow reflexes. Therefore, saliva and secretions just pool in his esophagus and airways. Constant monitoring and suctioning reduces the risk of aspirations.

Christopher's current list of diagnoses are as follows: hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy, severe cerebral palsy, severe spastic quadriplegia, cortical blindness, scoliosis, dislocated hip (result of spasticity) osteoporosis, asthma, sleep apnea, dysthermia, thyroid and adrenal dysfunction, seizure disorder, NPO, seasonal allergies. He functions on the intellectual level of a 6 month old. He uses 20+ different medications. He is wheelchair bound and completely dependent for all activities of daily living.

The day he was born, our lives changed! We haven't been on a family vacation in 20+ years. Christopher's care is a 24 hours a day/seven days a week job. He requires nursing care. Despite all of this, we love him dearly! I wouldn't change a thing. Without him, there would be a huge hole in our family! I plan to keep him at home where he is loved and safe for as long as I can. If he has to be placed into a nursing facility, he will die! I watch over all of his care in my home to be sure things are done properly and in a loving way. That has been the key to maintaining his quality of life. Oh, and did I mention that we adore him! None of this was his or my fault and he deserves all possible chances at a comfortable, safe, and loving life.

Without Medicaid, we will no longer have in home nursing help. It's impossible to stay awake and do caregiving responsibilities 24 hours a day! There are times, I'm not even able to eat a meal. I'm not able to lift more than 10 pounds anymore. At times, it's difficult for me to stand for more than a few minutes. My salvation and rest, is our in home nursing supports. My husband and I are now seniors. The loss of Christopher's Medicaid will be catastrophic for our family! Christopher will also be capped out if his benefits are once again capped. I am retired and have private insurance through my employer. If language exempts employers from coverage, that could also be devastating for us!

In finality, I hope you will take this little look into our family seriously. Every day is hard work, but it's so worth it, because Christopher deserves it. Oh and we love him! So for the sake of our family, families like ours and Christopher and all of the kids like him, I plead!!! I plead that you don't vote the Graham-Cassidy bill into law! It will be devastating for my family and families like mine!

As a result of the second surgery, I'm asplenic and a type 2 diabetic. #### Dear Members of the Senate Finance Committee:

I am the parent of a 15-year old with intensive mental health issues and autism. Through much effort on my part and the critical support I receive from Maryland's Medicaid Autism Waiver Program, I have been able to keep him in our home and out of a residential placement, which would be much more expensive and I believe, not in his best interests. With a huge amount of support, he is able to function at home and at school, despite aggressive outbursts and other challenging behaviors, and is developing skills of self-care and self-management that will enable him to be more independent (and less costly to support) during his upcoming adult life.

I urge you to vote **NO** on the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson Health Care Proposal, as this legislation will likely eliminate programs such as the Medicaid Autism Waiver Program. The block grant funding approach proposed in the legislation will leave Maryland with significantly less money going forward. Many programs serving high-need individuals such as the Autism Waiver Program will be impacted.

In my capacity as Executive Director of Maryland Coalition of Families, Maryland's family support organization, I hear about the families our staff support across the state – families who have children with mental health and substance use issues who are struggling to access essential treatment and recovery supports. Our families with young adult children who are struggling with opioid addiction are losing their children to overdoses as they are unable to access timely treatment. In short, here are my major reasons for opposing this bill:

It allows states to drop the requirement to cover mental health or substance use care. Today, Exchange plans are required to cover essential health benefits, which include treatment for mental health and substance use conditions. Under this bill, each state will have the freedom to drop or change these requirements, putting mental health and substance use benefits at risk.

It shifts Medicaid funding to a "per capita cap" system. Shifting to per capita cap funding (a fixed amount of funding per person) may sound reasonable, but would not keep up with growth in costs and needs. This would result in states being forced to cut Medicaid services and eligibility, which would harm children and adults with mental illness.

It effectively ends Medicaid expansion. One in three people covered by Medicaid expansion plans lives with a mental health or substance use condition. Under this bill, Medicaid expansion would be converted to a smaller, temporary block grant that states could use for health coverage or any other health purpose, with no guarantee of mental health or substance use coverage.

It reduces help to purchase health insurance. Block grants would provide a fixed amount of temporary federal funding to replace insurance subsidies, severely cutting federal help for people to buy insurance. This will leave many people unable to afford the coverage they need for mental health or substance use treatment.

Please vote **NO** on this potentially devastating bill. I would be happy to share my story or the stories of families my organization works with to demonstrate to legislators the risk and many unintended consequences of moving forward with this bill.

My son's chance at a normal life was destroyed by a massive seizure disorder when he was 5 months old. Aaron is now 39 years old, and he lives with us. He still has occasional seizures, and he cannot be left alone. It has been 39 years since I have been able to leave my home for any purpose, work or leisure, without making childcare arrangements.

When my son aged out of the school system at 21, he began attending a day program that offers him the opportunity to do simple work and socialize with others. It also offers those who are able to do so opportunities to work in the community and participate in community life. 66 other people benefit from that program; Medicaid pays half of the cost to run it. It also covers the cost of the 6 medications my son takes daily to prevent seizures. In addition, it funds group homes for people with disabilities many of whom are older and no longer have families. 31 people live in those homes. If Medicaid funds are slashed, those people will lose their homes. Where will they go? Who will take care of them? Our small center in rural Maryland is replicated a thousand times over all over the country serving families just like mine with the same worries about the future.

I am 70 years old; my husband is 75. We are one of about 4000 families in my state hoping to get a group home placement for our son before we die. The massive cut in Medicaid proposed by the Cassidy/Graham bill will only add thousands more families to that endless waiting list. We have no assurance from anyone that someone will take care of our son when we are gone. Millions of other people with disabilities and their families face the same challenges. We literally do not dare die. I hope that wiser, more compassionate people will prevail and defeat the inhumane and cruel Cassidy/Graham bill and devise a budget that takes into account the legitimate needs of our most vulnerable citizens. Please help us.
